



Title: In the Lesuto: in search of African mission life by John Widdicombe


Description: Basutoland is a small land lying between the inner and most westerly peaks of the Drakensberg which separates it from the Orange Free State and the Maluti Mountains. It is in this country where winter is the dry season with warm weather during the day and piercingly cold nights that the Basuto people reside. The book narrates their lives focusing on their social life, religion as well as their joy and tribulation. On page 28-29, the author explains the meanings of prefixes used which recur continuously in this narrative.

Unfortunately he died of a fever after exiting the river. The book was therefore compiled from his notebooks, and letters, he was a keen naturalist who became one of the first Europeans to see Victoria Falls in full flood during 1874. He lies buried in the Tati District, Rhodesia.



The Zulu nationalism and ethnic consciousness has always been represented and embodied in the institution of the monarchy. It gives a concise biography of the eight Zulu kings and assessment of the events and processes that each king encountered as well as their personalities, triumphs and follies.

The reckless courage and sheer violence of the battles is brought to the reader through the reproduction of fifty little known glass lantern slides in colour which were painted during the War.
