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UJ extends its teaching and learning facilities for global excellence

Work is underway at UJ while some building and refurbishment projects are completed.



During the past six years, the University has been extending and continues to improve its infrastructure to enhance the quality of teaching and learning facilities in support of its goal to achieve global excellence and stature. Some of the major building projects which the University has undertaken included the following:

UPGRADING OF THE DOORNFONTEIN CAMPUS (DFC) AND THE ADJACENT PERSKOR BUILDING

In November 2010, UJ asked the Department of Higher Education and Training (DHET) to approve the acquisition and refurbishment of the Perskor Building which is directly adjacent to the Doornfontein Campus. The Minister approved this request and the University started with this project by appointing consultants to draft a master plan for the extended Campus to inform the future long term vision and design of the Campus as a “world class” facility. The Campus Master Plan provided for:

- The refurbishment and reconfiguring of the Perskor building;
- The reconfiguration and optimisation of current faculty facilities within the John Orr Building, as well as the Library;
- The reconfiguration and refurbishment of the Kodak Building, Synagogue, Clinic and Administration Building;
- External works including new roadways, landscaping, parking, a sky bridge, new public spaces including a new arrival space and new gatehouses;
- The consolidation of the Faculty of Health Sciences on the Campus and the upgrading of the facilities for the Faculty of Engineering and the Built Environment.

The project started in October 2012 and has for all practical purposes been completed successfully.

CONSTRUCTION OF A SECOND STUDENT RESIDENCE AT THE SOWETO CAMPUS (SWC)

In June 2010, the University upgraded and extended the building facilities on the Soweto Campus with a joint Department of Higher

Education and Training (DHET)-University investment of about R436m. This upgrading of the Campus included sports facilities and the construction of the Hector Pietersen student residence on the Campus with 313 beds, the latter completed by the end of 2010. This provided some student accommodation on Campus but by far not enough to meet the demand. The University again applied for state funding to build another student residence which was approved by the Minister of Higher Education in October 2012. This second student residence is currently under construction on the Soweto Campus adjacent to the Hector Pietersen Residence and will be similar in design. It will contain 288 single student units, is three storeys high and will share the main community hall in the Hector Pietersen residence. This residence is expected to be completed by June 2015.

CONSTRUCTION OF CLASSROOMS FOR THE FUNDA UJABULE SCHOOL AND LECTURE VENUES ON THE SOWETO CAMPUS

In 2010, the Faculty of Education, which is based on the Soweto Campus, established the UJ Institute for Childhood Education with the Funda UJabule School at its core. This was done in terms of a collaborative project between UJ and the Gauteng Education Department. The Institute promotes and coordinates research and practice in childhood learning and development. At about the same time, the Faculty also started with a Foundation Phase teacher education programme and the Funda UJabule School serves as a teaching school for the Foundation Phase Education degree programme in the Faculty. The students in this programme all do either Sotho or Zulu as language. Thus, the Foundation Phase programme explicitly addresses the need for African-language Foundation Phase Teachers. Students regularly observe practice in the school and they also participate in micro-lesson activities →

at the School. The School also serves as a teaching facility for the Intermediate Phase Education degree programme which was introduced in 2013. Additional classrooms for the School have just been completed. Additional lecture venues for all students on the Campus are also in the process of construction and this project is expected to be completed by the end of the year (2014).

CONSTRUCTION OF TWO 750-SEATER AUDITORIUMS ON THE AUCKLAND PARK KINGSWAY CAMPUS (APK)


The two new auditoriums currently under construction intend to provide the University with highly valuable large teaching venues, as a response to the growing demand for large lecturing venues. The facility completes one of the last important pieces in the configuration of 'ring' buildings on the

Campus and offers the opportunity to create a new signature building for the University. The two new 750-seat auditorium style venues sit together in the landscape under a flying roof either side of a public courtyard, and provide new connectivity into the adjacent A-Ring building. Ablution facilities will be designed to concurrently service the new building, supplement the existing A-Ring circulation routes and will be accessible from external study areas on the popular Wi-Fi lawn. Energy efficiency will be an important feature in the design of the facility. Above all, the new building intends to provide an 'iconic' symbol and statement of progression for the University, and will enhance the ability of the University to deliver on quality teaching thus contributing to excellence in higher education. This project is expected to be completed by October 2014. ❖

UJ legal expert elected as Secretary-General of the IAC

DAVID BILCHITZ, A Professor and Director at the South African Institute for Advanced Constitutional, Public, Human Rights and International Law (SAIFAC) – a leading South African research centre within the Faculty of Law at UJ – has been elected to the position of Secretary-General of the International Association of Constitutional Law (IACL).

The overriding objective of IACL, which has a longstanding relationship with SAIFAC, is to provide a forum where constitutionalists from all parts of the world can network and understand each other's systems, explain and reflect on their own, and engage in fruitful comparison, for a variety of purposes.

The Secretary-General, one of the most important positions in the Association, and an internationally respected academic in the field of constitutional law, is responsible for ensuring the efficient organisation and running of the Association i.e. efficient administration of its activities.

Prof Bilchitz has previously been the African Regional Co-ordinator of the IACL project on Socio-Economic rights, and has to this end organised and functioned as a constitutional expert in two workshops held for legal profession in Kenya on socio-economic rights provisions in the new Constitution in light of comparative

constitutional law. He also supervised a joint project and research with the Socio-Economic Rights Institute on possible litigation relating to the right to food.

Prof Bilchitz holds a BA (Hons) LLB cum laude from Wits University. In 2001, he graduated with an MPhil in Philosophy from St John's College, University of Cambridge and with a PhD in law (and political philosophy) from the same university in 2004.

He worked as law clerk to Chief Justice Pius Langa of the Constitutional Court in 2000 (who was then Deputy Judge-President). From August 2004 until 2006, he worked at Ross Kriel Attorneys, a law firm dealing with public sector law. He was also a Senior Research Associate at the University of Pretoria, where he lectured on the LLM programme and worked in the PhD programme, and a Visiting Senior Research Fellow at the University of the Witwatersrand, where he lectured jurisprudence for five years.

Prof Bilchitz is widely published in a range of fields relating to fundamental rights including proportionality and fundamental rights, socio-economic rights, business and human rights, gay and lesbian rights, religious rights and animal rights. He has also presented at numerous conferences both in South Africa and internationally.

PROF BILCHITZ WAS ONE OF THE KEY DRIVERS IN THE CAMPAIGN FOR CIVIL MARRIAGE FOR SAME-SEX COUPLES IN SA



As a committed activist working towards social reform with his involvement in feminist, gay rights, poverty and animal rights issues, Prof Bilchitz was one of the key drivers in the campaign for civil marriage for same-sex couples in South Africa and acted as legal adviser to the Joint Working Group, a coalition of 17 lesbian and gay organisations, in 2006. He also campaigned for shelters for the homeless, taught literacy and numeracy skills to street children, and was involved in a campaign to prevent the culling of elephants. ❖



UJ research study on the mentally ill, homeless link

∞∞∞ The number of homeless people in the City of Johannesburg is increasing, which has left policy makers, healthcare providers, social workers and charity organisations investigating the factors behind the increase.

UJ'S CENTRE FOR Social Development in Africa (CSDA) released its research findings on a study conducted on homelessness and mental health in Hillbrow, South Africa, as well as the research findings on poverty and disability in South Africa on 11 June 2014.

Says Prof Leila Patel, the Director of the CSDA and former Director General of the Department of Social Development (UJ): "Among the homeless are those with a mental illness. Very little is known about the reasons for mentally ill people becoming homeless, their life on the streets and their survival strategies."

She added that the research focused on six homeless people, six homeless people with mental illness and six service providers who work with homeless people.

The research findings are addressing aspects such as policies contributing to homelessness in South Africa, reasons for individuals becoming homeless, life on the streets including

health and exposure to violence and strategies for survival. Furthermore, the research explored the services provided to homeless people with a mental illness, user perceptions of service delivery and service providers and the challenges experienced by service providers.

SOME KEY FINDINGS OF THE HOMELESSNESS AND MENTAL HEALTH IN HILLBROW, SOUTH AFRICA:

Reasons for homelessness - Family breakdown was the most frequent reason for homelessness in the case of both the homeless and homeless mentally ill groups. Other reasons included substance abuse, poverty, seeking employment or adventure, mental illness, peer pressure and the desire to evade apprehension by the police for criminal activities in which they had been involved.

Conclusion – Results reflect the failure of housing, welfare, education and health care policies and need to be viewed against the backdrop of poverty, unemployment and violence in South Africa. In order to improve the

quality of life of homeless persons and homeless people with mental illness, it is imperative that the Department of Social Development revisit its funding model for outreach services and provide further subsidised residential facilities for homeless persons; and that all stakeholders work together to address the causes and manifestations of homelessness through prevention, education and treatment.

Health and exposure to violence – Their health was compromised and they had all experienced violent assaults.

Relations between homeless and homeless mentally ill persons – Findings suggested that both the homeless and homeless mentally ill groups related well to one another and shared a common sense of identity. However, the homeless mentally ill persons appeared to be more vulnerable and more dependent on other homeless persons for their protection and survival.

Survival strategies – Despite adverse living conditions, they revealed a sense of urgency and resilience

by developing different survival strategies. Ways of coping included engaging in activities such as washing, parking and guarding cars; use of alcohol and drugs to de-stress; deriving support from relationships with partners; compliance with treatment and medication; and reliance on spiritual beliefs. ❖

The first two signed copies were given to Adv. Thuli Madonsela and well-known South

African broadcast personality Leanne Manas, who engaged UJ Alumni during the first of UJ's new series of Exceptional Talks by Extraordinary People.

In the book's foreword, Prof Njabulo Ndebele, Chancellor of UJ, stated that the University has forged itself an identity unique among South African and international universities.

Prof Ndebele cited: "In its development as a successful post-apartheid institution, UJ has created, and held open a space for individuals of many diverse cultures and languages to grow into a single well-integrated, multi-campus university community.

UJ brand, once again, one of the coolest in SA!

UJ has, once again, taken a strong lead as one of the coolest university brands in the Sunday Times Generation Next youth brand-preference survey, the largest preferred brand survey conducted in South Africa.

THE SUNDAY TIMES Generation Next 2014 youth brand-preference survey has given UJ the thumbs-up, placing it firmly in the limelight. UJ was rated second coolest university in South Africa. This is the fifth consecutive year that UJ was voted as one of the country's coolest higher education brands, after the University of Cape Town.

UJ, with its previous, sometimes tongue-in-cheek advertising

campaigns promoted the University's status as a leader in tertiary education.

In its tenth year, the Sunday Times Generation Next Survey polled almost 6 000 young urban South Africans between the ages of 8 and 23.

UJ and KPMG team up with IntelliLAB to launch anti-corruption hotline

UJ's finance department has recently teamed up with auditing powerhouse KPMG to implement ethical and anti-corruption practice in the workplace.

THE UNIVERSITY SAW it fit to launch the campaign parallel to their annual Staff Day in May 2014 at one of the University's sports grounds. To add a creative twist to the campaign, UJ turned to creative house, IntelliLAB, to come up with something extraordinary.

KPMG and UJ's finance department have created a hotline where people can turn to anonymously if they suspect any fowl play in the workplace. The question, however, was "How do we get staff to be interested in this?"

IntelliLAB, which comprises of a variation of creative minds from television directors to graphic designers, to communication and marketing experts, came up with an angle to make ethical practice in the workplace an appealing topic to the masses.


To draw the crowds nearer, IntelliLAB set up a red carpet area where people were required to take a selfie and upload it to any social media platform of their choice, using the hashtag #EthicsSelfie and in turn, stand a chance to win one of two iPads. That's not all though - while people were queuing up to take their selfies, various banners were present, communicating all the details about the Ethics Hotline as well as a video entitled 'Mr. Clean'. The video shows a man who has engaged in a variety of unethical practices ranging from embezzlement of tuition fees to unethical spending of overseas travel allowances. The hotline number was also displayed in the background of the

selfie-taking section. This way, people have the number even if they did not save it on their cellular phones.

"Participation in a message is important in changing behaviour and communicating effectively", says Lynette Oelschig, strategist at IntelliLAB.

Producer, DuPreez Strauss explains more on the production behind the scenes on the day: "We wanted to create a fun and engaging environment in which every staff member of UJ could become a star in the campaign. Adding a touch of glamour to the day's proceedings was what we wanted to achieve, and I think all our elements came together beautifully. From the plush red carpet to the beautifully designed interior of the tent and our slick and informative video that looped inside the tent all day. Everyone certainly remembered their visit to the Ethics Stall."

Feedback from KPMG with regard to the usage of the ethics line was received with reports that there has already been response with people using the line. Furthermore, the general sentiment from the staff at the staff day was positive and they are very pleased to have a tool to report unethical behaviour at UJ anonymously. ❖

UJ Council announces new terms of office for management

Following UJ's Council meeting on 12 June 2014, the UJ Council resolved to extend and offer terms of office for management.

THE CURRENT TERMS of office of the Vice-Chancellor and Principal, Prof Ihron Rensburg, and the Deputy Vice-Chancellor (DVC): Academic, Prof Angina Parekh, expire on 31 March 2016 and 31 August 2016, respectively. Having followed the processes prescribed in the Statute of the University and the applicable Council policies, Council resolved to offer Prof Rensburg and Prof Parekh further and final terms of offices.

The University is pleased to announce that Prof Rensburg will hold the office of Vice-Chancellor until 31 January 2020. Prof Parekh will hold the office of Deputy Vice-Chancellor: Academic until 31 August 2021.

In addition, the University is pleased to announce that Chairperson of Council, Prof Roy Marcus, was elected as Chairperson of Council for a period of five years, starting from 1 July 2014.

Similarly, the University's Council also elected Mr Mike Teke as Vice-Chairperson of Council for a period of five years, commencing on 1 August 2014.

Prof Marcus was serving as Chairperson of Council whilst Mr Teke is still



serving as Chairperson of Council's Human Resources Committee.


CONVOCAION

The SRC elections, which were postponed from 2013, are completed. The UJ Council has approved the elections and endorsed the results. The term of the SRC will expire on 31 December 2014.

UJ is particularly pleased to welcome the first female SRC President, Ms Nikkie Mboweni. Ms Mboweni is a final year student, completing a National Diploma in Human Resource Management. ❖

Digital pioneer Prof Immink inspires UJ engineering graduates

Engineers have the power to change our world. New environments present new opportunities, driving innovation and a call for change.

THIS WAS THE message from Prof Kornelis (Kees) Antonie Schouhamer Immink that inspired graduates at UJ on 10 June 2014.

Prof Immink, one of the most prolific inventors of the 20th century in consumer electronics, accepted an honorary doctoral degree – Doctor Honoris Causa for Technical and Scientific Research during the University’s second graduation series. UJ’s Faculty of Engineering and the Built Environment conferred the honorary doctoral degree on Prof Immink as acknowledgement for his instrumental role in the development of digital audio, video and data recording systems, and for the profound impact his contributions and inventions has made in today’s digital society.

In his address, Prof Immink expressed his gratitude for receiving an honorary doctorate from the University and spoke about his passion for science and engineering, saying: “I am an engineer because I have a sincere passion for science and engineering. I’ve had this passion since I was a young boy. I have always loved everything that moves - from steam engines, to bicycles and locomotives, to sailing boats and planes.” Prof Immink added that “I would have loved to work side-by-side with James Watt on the design of a new steam engine. Or to have worked with Michael Faraday on developing the first electrical motor. These are fascinating inventions by pioneering engineers.”

He emphasised that engineers have throughout history changed the world

we live in. “Book printing, gunpowder and even the industrial revolution are the results of engineering. Steve Jobs hired John Sculley from PepsiCo with the legendary pitch, ‘Do you want to sell sugared water for the rest of your life? Or, do you want to come with me and change the world?’ Sculley went on to join Apple, one of the world’s biggest technology companies. The results were evident. So, yes, ‘Engineers do change the world!’”

Prof Immink concluded: “An engineer must be creative and be able to solve technical problems. To be an inventive engineer, you have to be willing to live with the bipolar feeling that either the problem at hand is too complicated or that you are just too dumb to solve it. An engineer must have an excellent education. To achieve excellence in engineering requires good governance in our academic institutions and beyond, and the freedom to conduct independent research. To the new engineers and scientists gathered together in this room, I’d like to say ‘Spread out over the world, and change it to a better one’. You can do it; your fellow engineers and scientists of the past have paved your way.”

This was the second honorary doctorate the University awarded this year. An honorary doctoral degree - Doctor Legum (Doctor of Laws) honoris causa was awarded on US President Barack Hussein Obama in acknowledgement of his social and intellectual achievements that strengthen international diplomacy in May 2014. US Ambassador to South-Africa, Ambassador Patrick Gaspard accepted the honorary doctorate on behalf of US President Obama. ❖



In his frank and inspiring address to the audience, Ambassador Gaspard spoke about the fire of his righteous anger, saying: “I’m angry that too many of our brothers and sisters will never have the opportunity that you and I have had to pursue excellence. I’m angry that some of you will be turned away from meaningful employment because you don’t have the right relatives. I’m angry that there’s a radius of hunger from Detroit to Diepsloot.”

He urged the young graduates to use their degrees for the good of their communities and to roll up their sleeves to make a marked difference in the lives of those around them.

He highlighted the power that our youth possess in a technologically advanced society. He said; “In one hand, you have degrees that say that you are indeed brilliant and beautiful. In your other hand many are even as I speak scrolling through your smartphones which concentrate more human capital in your hands than has ever been deployed in recorded history. What is in your hands? You could use your data to stream and watch yet again the attack Beyonce’s sister launched on Jay Z. You could go down that rabbit hole again. Or you might combine that law degree and smartphone and create a tool that completely changes the interface and accountability between civil society and government. What is in your hands?” ❖

Commemoration June 16 with 1976 stalwarts

ooo The UJ Soweto Campus hosted the 1976 Soweto Uprising stalwarts who organised the historic march. The stalwarts were invited to the talk on June 16, 2014 at UJ, to inspire the current youth to do better and build South Africa's economy with the opportunities presented to the youth of today.

ON, 16 JUNE 2014, young and old from around Johannesburg gathered at the UJ Soweto Campus to commemorate Youth Day in an Open Conversation lecture. The lecture, flanked by former brave Naledi High School students Ms Eunice Molefe, Ms Zanele Mthembu, Mr Enos Ngutshane, Ms Hazel Hlabanyane, Mr Kenny Mavatulana, and Mr Seth Mazibuko, was motivational.

The stalwarts' messages to the youth were mainly about young people's responsibility to build the South African economy through entrepreneurship, becoming less dependent on government handouts. To the 1976 youth - now grandparents and regarded veterans - their struggle was for freedom and democracy, they said. They urged young people to seize the opportunities and educate themselves.

"When our parents had given up hope back in 1976, we, the young ones, took on the responsibility to restore faith and dignity in our communities and

school yards. Today, we are passing on the baton to you to build the economy and prepare a better future for the next generations. It is through today's youth's responsible actions, that this country will move forward," said Mr Enos Ngutshane, the man who wrote a letter to the then Minister of Education, opposing the use of Afrikaans as a medium of instruction in schools.

Ms Mthembu addressed the young women in particular, saying they needed to educate themselves in order to lead successful and responsible lifestyles. She said that teenage pregnancies and child social grants hindered women's professional and academic development.

Dr Joe Manyaka, UJ Soweto Campus Director, opened the floor for discussions at the University. Dr Manyaka echoed the role of UJ's contribution to society in meaningful ways. "The University embarked on an infrastructure upgrade a few years

ago not only to have state-of-the-art structures, but to improve the quality of education here. We visited schools around Soweto, and the same upgrades need to happen there to ensure that we produce the best students. UJ also has a school near the Campus, this school will, in future, serve as a feeder school to the University through the good quality of education resources we have invested there," he said.

Also present at the lecture were the newly elected Student Representative Council (SRC) that will resemble the leadership of the 1976 march organisers from Soweto schools. The

SRC, now part of the 20:20 Project, comprises of learners from Soweto schools and one UJ student, Precious Zama Qwabe, who will steer the learners into leadership excellence. Project 20:20 was founded by Mr Seth Mazibuko, with the sole purpose of providing leadership that will reflect on the 20 years of democracy and the next 20 years of building South Africa.

Mazibuko urged young people to look after themselves amidst the challenges such as HIV and AIDS, substance abuse and vulnerability to socio-economic pressures.

The SRC, together with people celebrating Youth Day, started a march from Morris Isaacson High School to Phefeni Senior Secondary School before heading to UJ for a final Youth Day engagement. Poetry and songs resounded the day, providing a philanthropic feeling and meaning to the fallen heroes and heroines of 1976. ❖

LUSANDA NJENGE, THE niece of the Chairperson of the African Union Commission, Dr Nkosazana Dlamini-Zuma, and more than 180 fellow graduating students shared the stage with one of the most prolific inventors of the 20th century in consumer electronics during a graduation session of UJ's on 10 June 2014.

Njenge graduated Cum Laude with a Master's degree in Philosophy (MPhil) Engineering Management. Her academic achievement at UJ prompted her aunt, Dr Dlamini-Zuma, to attend the graduation session in celebration of her and other graduates as they reach a milestone that marks a new beginning for the future engineers.

Her minor dissertation, entitled "Total quality management and performance in process engineering design firms in South Africa," explored various aspects of the engineering field. Njenge was guided under the supervision of UJ's Faculty of Engineering and the Built Environment, Prof J Pretorius and Dr A Vermeulen.

Says Njenge: "I am grateful for the University to have been able

to stand at the podium and to be acknowledged for what I have achieved. It has been an interesting academic journey filled with challenges, lots of work and long but rewarding days and nights. It would not have been possible if it was not for the exceptional lecturing staff at UJ and all the support I received from the University throughout my studies. The Faculty of Engineering and the Built Environment conferred the Doctor Honoris Causa for Technical and Scientific Research, on Prof Immink, who was instrumental in the development of virtually all digital audio, video and data recording systems. This honorary doctorate was in recognition of the profound impact his contributions and inventions made in today's society. ❖

UJ confers honorary degree on US President Barack Obama

USA Ambassador to South-Africa, Ambassador Patrick Gaspard, accepted the honorary doctoral degree – Doctor Legum (Doctor of Laws) honoris causa – on behalf of President Barack Hussein Obama.

UJ'S FACULTY OF Law conferred the honorary doctoral degree on President Obama in acknowledgement of his social and intellectual achievements that strengthen international diplomacy on 22 May 2014.

Ambassador Gaspard accepted the honorary doctorate during the first session of this year's second graduation series of the University. More than 2100 students received recognition for their academic achievements during this second graduation series, from 22 May to 11 June 2014.

In 2013, UJ announced that President Obama accepted the University's award on him of the honorary doctorate when he visited South Africa. UJ Soweto Campus was the proud host of President Obama for his Young African Leader town hall engagement on 29 June 2013.

During his engagement, President Obama announced the launch of the Washington Fellowship for Young African Leaders. The fellowship will see 46 young South Africans join a total of 500 emerging leaders, screened from 50,000 applicants across the continent for a 6 week training programme in some of the finest US universities to enhance their skills in entrepreneurship, public management,

and civic engagement. Tebogo Ditshego, an UJ Alumnus and voted one of Forbes Magazine's top 30 African Entrepreneurs Under 30 for 2014, was selected as one of the exceptional recipients of the fellowship.

In his speech, Ambassador Gaspard said, "I recognize what has been built in this institution and in your lives because my orientation in struggle and self-liberation is informed by L'Ouverture and Lumumba. As a pilgrim for democracy who traveled to your country a quarter of a century ago when places not far from here like Boipatong Township were filled with the specter of revolution and death, I know that your achievements here are nearly miraculous and are to be guarded like precious treasure."

Ambassador Gaspard further highlighted the achievements of the bilateral partnership between the US and South-Africa. He sighted the joint accomplishments on healthcare where through the US PEPFAR programme the rate of HIV transmissions were significantly reduced and vulnerable children are protected, as well as the capacitation of lasting healthcare infrastructure in even the most rural parts of the country.

He further highlighted the prospects that a new demographic South Africa holds for international development by saying; "Through the African Growth and Opportunity Act, South Africa was able to export over \$2 billion dollars of duty free goods to US markets last year alone. Over 600 American companies have planted roots here and are contributing more than 150,000 good jobs to the economy. All of this is occurring as global investors get more deeply engaged in Africa as a target rich environment with a young and hungry workforce and increasingly more democratic structures."

Out with the old, in with the new – Radiography Department name change and new courses

UJ RECENTLY INTRODUCED four new approved four-year qualifications (professional degrees) following the implementation of goals of the National Plan for Higher Education in South Africa. Due to the introduction of these new qualifications, a departmental name change became necessary.

The Department of Radiography is now called the Department of Medical Imaging and Radiation Sciences (MIRS). The department is located at the Doornfontein Campus on the 6th floor of the John Orr Building, on the West wing.

The approval and the planned offering of these new qualifications is aligned to the University's strategic objectives for the period 2014-2025 which have the primary goal of achieving global excellence and stature.

The National Plan for Higher Education in South Africa's goals, among others, is to “build new institutional and organisational forms and new institutional identities and cultures as integral components of a single coordinated national higher education system.” This goal includes two outcomes, increased programme and infrastructural collaboration and restructuring the institutional landscape of higher education (CHE, 2009). In line with this, the department embarked on

obtaining the approval of offering new professional degrees and has obtained the approval to start offering these new qualifications.

The naming of the new qualifications no longer embraces the term Radiography as a common denominator, but expresses the core function of each qualification individually.

There was a general agreement that the former name of the Department only fitted the Bachelor of Diagnostic Radiography qualification and thus by implication excludes the other three qualifications. Therefore, the Department decided on the new name in order to sufficiently embrace all the programmes offered in the department while ensuring that the department follows the national and international trends of the discipline.

The B. Technology and the N. Diploma programmes will be phased out and replaced by the four new professional degrees. The M. and D. Technology degrees will also be phased out in future to be replaced by the Master's Degree in Radiography and the Doctoral Degree in Radiography, respectively.

The effective date of change of the department name is 01 January 2015 as approved in the Senate meeting of 12 September 2013. The implementation

of the new professional degrees will be effective from 01 January 2016. ❖



UJ's impact at the 2014 Commonwealth Games

Eight University of Johannesburg (UJ) students, club athletes and staff members took part in this year's Commonwealth Games in Glasgow, Scotland, as part of Team South Africa.

UJ'S PRESENCE AT the Games – which took place from 23 July until 3 August 2014 – was bolstered even further with three alumni sports stars who joined more than 150 of the country's top athletes who competed in 16 sporting codes.

Before jetting off, the University's coaches and sport managers were hopeful that the chances looked good for these sportsmen and women to bring home a few medals.

"Looking at our ranking list and the current performances of some of our athletes, UJ stands a good chance of bringing back at least three medals," said Francois Fouché, Senior Sport Manager: UJ.

The athletics team that went to the Commonwealth Games included 25-year-old Transport Management student Zarck Visser who will be participating in the long jump event. In early July, Visser was ranked first in South Africa and Africa, second in the Commonwealth and sixth in the world.

He was joined by fellow Transport Management student, 24-year-old Ruswahl Samaai, who lies second in the national rankings, fifth in the Commonwealth and 15th worldwide.

Olympic silver medallist and UJ club member, Godfrey Mokoena, rounded out the university's athletics contingent. The 29-year-old triple jumper, before heading to the Commonwealth Games, occupied the number one spot nationally and was number five in the Commonwealth rankings.

Temporary UJ staff member Emmarie Fouché, one of the highest qualified jumps coaches in SA, joined the team as the national jumps coach. Emmarie, who said it was an honour to be able to "live out her passion at the highest level", played a vital role during the competition. "The coach has to look after all the jumps participants, making sure that they know exactly where and when they need to practice. Then also of course provide help and feedback during the competition."

UJ was also the force to be reckoned with on the hockey field, with 24-year-old chiropractic student Bernadette Coston, who has 100 caps for South Africa, making the women's team. Clinton Panther joined the men's side.

Club player, Lilian du Plessis, joined Coston in the women's line-up, while staff member, Adrian Carolan, filled the role of video analyst.

"It's always an honour, not only for the players but also for UJ hockey, to have a presence in a national team," said UJ hockey manager Elize le Roux. "As a University, we feel we had a hand in their inclusion. It's a feather in our cap and confirmation that we are utilising the right system in coaching our players." Le Roux added that hockey development was still relatively new to UJ.



UJ alumna, Lisa-Marie Deetlefs and Marsha Cox, once again showed up in the women's team, while Erasmus Pieterse was included in the men's squad.

Springbok rugby star Bryan Habana, who attended the former RAU, took to the field as part of the rugby sevens team.

According to Francois Fouché, UJ is a generous contributor of talent for national and international teams.

"On a junior level, athletes like Monique Stander (800m) and Lizelle Jordaan (shot-put) will represent South Africa at the world junior athletic championships later this year," said Fouché

"Earlier this year, Anelle Oosthuizen and her coach Carl Meyer, represented the country at the world race walking championships, while Emmarie, Zarck, Jaco Engelbrecht (shot-put) and Pierre Bignaut (national throwing coach) took part in the world indoor champs."

He added that the University strives to create a supportive high performance environment to develop talent and provide a platform for athletes to perform at the highest level.

"It means the world to us to have athletes in the Commonwealth Games team, especially in our attempt to make our mark as a club and University on a global playing field.

"These quality performances by our athletes cement our spot as the preferred sporting University locally and internationally."

Team SA raked in a total of 13 gold, 10 silver and 11 bronze medals, finishing in seventh position on the medals table in Scotland. SA was number one in Africa in the competition. ❖

UJ Sport dominated the 2014 Gauteng Sport Awards

UJ received their fair share of bragging rights at the recent Gauteng Sport Awards when they were the biggest winners of the night.

UJFM 95.4'S THE Sport Network with Andrew Hope scooped the Sport Programme of the Year award – beating Metro FM's 083 Sports @ 6 with Robert Marawa and SABC's Sport @ 10, hosted by Thomas Mlambo.

The Awards ceremony took place on 11 July 2014 at the Monte Casino in Fourways, Johannesburg.

UJ won in six categories, including the coveted Sportswoman of the Year and Sportsman of the Year titles, awarded to Hockey players Pietie Coetzee and Clinton Panther, respectively.

Notably, UJ also scooped the Sportswoman of the Year with a Disability and Sportsman of the Year with a Disability, when Kgothatso Montjane and Lucas Sithole were announced the winners. Sithole became the first African to win a US Open Quad Grand Slam last year September, beating world number one, David Wagner, in the finals.

Andrew Hope, who was up against sport journalists from ANN7, Daily Sun and Power FM, was the winner in the category for the Sport Journalist of the Year – making UJ the winner of both the awards for which UJFM was nominated for.

Since its launch, the Gauteng Sport Awards have seen tremendous growth, with the number of nominations submitted having doubled in 2013.

In keeping with the '20 years of democracy' theme, which has seen the nation pause to celebrate the dawn of democracy in South Africa through various activities, this year's Gauteng Sport Awards celebrated the province's contribution towards building South Africa's social cohesion through sport.

In the same vein, the Awards also commemorated Gauteng's 20 years of excellence as the leading sporting province. ❖

Panther seals varsity title en route to World Cup

UJ'S HOCKEY ACE, Clinton Panther, had much to celebrate as he scored one of the winning goals in the Varsity Hockey tournament final against Maties.

The 23-year-old midfielder has not only been a stalwart in UJ's campaign, but also formed a vital part of the South African attack during the Rabobank Hockey World Cup in the Netherlands from 31 May until 15 June 2014.

The Varsity Cup final was a hard-fought affair that ended in a penalty shootout after the teams finished on two goals apiece after normal time. Panther was one of the UJ players who found the net in the sudden death phase.

"There was great unity in the team and we were all motivated and driven to achieve a common goal," he said about the team's success. "I worked hard during the tournament and I hope there are many more games to follow."

He added that the series gave many university players an opportunity to perform and show their skills. "I believe this tournament is a great positive for the future of hockey," he said.

The Finance student was part of the UJ side for the past five years – a journey he believes gave him a sturdy foundation. "I really enjoy the tempo and combinations our team play with.

"We follow a tough fitness regime, which I believe has contributed a huge amount to my performance. It has given me a strong base to work from."

Panther's hard work on and off the field paid off when he was selected for the national senior men's team that will contest the World Cup.

"I'm over the moon to be able to represent South Africa at the Rabobank World Cup. It's a major tournament and a prestigious event for any professional sportsman.

As one of the latter, the utility player, who matriculated from Michaelhouse in KwaZulu-Natal, hopes to be a role model for his teammates by playing every game with "heart and determination". ❖

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
