- \*"Document Your Story" with Kalina Pierga: If you have ٠ been directly or indirectly impacted by the criminal legal system, you are invited to have your story documented for public presentation.
- \*"Reflection, Connection, and Storytelling Circle" with ٠ Annie Buth: Circle is a restorative justice practice that provides an opportunity for connecting with others in an intentional and relational way. Circles draw from Indigenous practices, and they create the space for people to be seen and heard.

- \*"Imprisoned Hearts" with Broderick Hollins: Once a loved one is incarcerated, their family is as well. This session will provide a healing space for family members to share, encourage one another, and dream/envision a future together.
- \*"Surviving the System" with Broderick Hollins: People are much more that the crime they are convicted of committing. This is session is for people who are survivors of the criminal legal system. We will explore our stories, our strengths, and who we are through art and discussion.
- \*"Together" with Broderick Hollins: Together we can build another community out of the pain and suffering of mass incarceration to make the land of our dreams. Everyone is invited to join for creating connections through storytelling and art.

## PARTICIPANTS

John Greco is the Robert L. McDevitt, K.S.G., K.C.H.S. ٠ and Catherine H. McDevitt L.C.H.S Chair in Philosophy at Georgetown University. He is the author of Putting Skeptics in Their Place: The Nature of Skeptical Arguments and Their Role in Philosophical Inquiry (Cambridge 2000); Achieving Knowledge: A Virtue-theoretic Account of Epistemic Normativity (Cambridge 2010); and The Transmission of Knowledge (Cambridge 2020).

- Daniel Fryer is an assistant professor of law and philosophy at the University of Michigan whose work draws on scholarship in social and political philosophy, law, history, and public policy. He is also influenced by social movements and intellectual discourse outside the academy. Daniel currently serves on the Washtenaw County Board of Commissioners' Advisory Council on Reparations.
- Dr. José Medina is Walter Dill Scott Professor of Philosophy at Northwestern University. His fields of expertise are critical philosophy of race, feminist and queer theory, social epistemology, and political philosophy. Medina's latest book is *The Epistemology of Protest: Silencing, Epistemic Activism, and the Communicative Life of Resistance (*Oxford University Press: 2023).
- Veli Mitova is Professor in Philosophy and Director of the <u>African Centre for Epistemology and Philosophy of</u> <u>Science</u> (ACEPS) at the University of Johannesburg. She is a collaborator on <u>Epistemic Reparations</u>, hosting two of its events at ACEPS – <u>Epistemic Wrongs and Epistemic</u> <u>Reparations Workshop</u> (Nov 2022) and <u>Epistemic</u> <u>Reparations and the Right to be Known in Post-Apartheid South Africa</u> (June 2024).
- Kalina Pierga is a filmmaker, documentary journalist, and Medill Journalism alum. She is passionate about cultural

documentation and social justice. Her recent work includes video production for Northwestern's Epistemic Reparations Global Working Group, content creation for Here to Stay Community Land Trust, and clerking for an immigration law firm in the Chicago area.
