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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

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## Introduction

The Faculty of Art, Design and Architecture (FADA) is committed to the notion that art, design and architecture can change the world. By encouraging creativity, collaboration, communication and critical thinking, we challenge our students in all eight programmes to expand their fields beyond the conventional boundaries in imagining the world they hope to have and to leave behind.

We emphasise sustainability, relevance and an engagement with the real world in our programmes, and connect actively with the dynamism, creativity and diversity of Johannesburg in promoting new approaches to design education that support the University's vision of being an international university of choice, anchored in Africa and dynamically shaping the future. The Faculty has excellent facilities and staff, and has a longstanding reputation for producing first-rate graduates who are well equipped to deal with the challenges of solving real-world problems.

We work closely with industry to ensure that our programmes remain relevant, and that students are empowered to deal with the constant change that characterises the highly competitive world of the creative professions. Through networks of national and international linkages, the Faculty hosts an ongoing programme of national and international visitors to engage with students, as well as an ever-changing roster of exhibitions and public events to promote what we do.

The FADA flagship research centre, Visual Identities in Art and Design, is beginning to establish itself as a national thought leader in promoting practice-led research, and continues to contribute significantly to the research output of the Faculty.

Overall, the Faculty made excellent progress in 2013, while at the same time being responsive to the changing strategic imperatives of the University.

#### **GOVERNANCE**

At the end of 2012 Prof Marian Sauthoff retired as Executive Dean of the Faculty, having served in that capacity since 2006. During her tenure, Prof Sauthoff succeeded in creating an integrated Faculty within the context of a comprehensive university. Not least of her contribution was the extent to which the vocational basis that informed the pedagogy of the legacy departments of the old Technikon Witwatersrand was transformed into a more academically-intensive mix of programmes and qualifications. She was also instrumental in creating extremely effective and efficient governance and administrative structures, leaving behind a highly functional environment that is well

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positioned to rise to the challenge of the University's ambition to attain global excellence and stature.

Prof. Federico Freschi took up the position of Executive Dean in January 2013. An NRF-rated art historian, Prof Freschi has extensive experience as an academic and academic administrator. He has taught at the former Cape Technikon, the Universities of Cape Town and Stellenbosch, and more recently at the University of the Witwatersrand, where he held the position of Associate Professor of History of Art. At Wits he also served as Acting Head of School of the Wits School of Arts, and later as Deputy Head of School. He has management experience in the private sector, having worked as a business consultant in human resources, and

prior to joining UJ was the Executive Manger and Senior Curator of the Goodman Gallery, Cape Town.

Prof. Freschi inherited the 2013 strategic objectives for the Faculty, which had been identified as:

- a focus on building a competitive and relevant programme mix and offering;
- a continued contribution to the technology drive;
- enhancing the staff profile in terms of qualifications and development;
- promoting and sustaining excellence and relevance in teaching and learning;
- nurturing an environment conducive to research and

creative production;

- advancing Faculty recognition in alignment with University's strategic drivers;
- ensuring operational efficiency and institutional culture;
- continued engagement with community service.

The Faculty made excellent progress in all these areas, while also engaging actively with the new vision and energy brought by a change in management. In June 2013 all full-time staff, both academic and administrative, came together for the first time as a group to discuss the Faculty's vision, mission and strategy in order to align these with the University's emerging 'Global Excellence and Stature' strategy.



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## STUDENT ENROLMENT, PROFILE AND PERFORMANCE



Although slightly under-enrolled in terms of its institutional enrolment target, the Faculty nonetheless continued to grow in 2013, with a total of 1 284 students enrolled in its programmes, as opposed to 1 247 in 2012. Of these, 311 were enrolled in undergraduate degrees and 923 in undergraduate diplomas, giving a total undergraduate enrolment of 1 234. The total postgraduate enrolment was 48. The enrolment of two occasional students made up the final total. International

student enrolment remained relatively static at 41, a marginal drop from 42 in both 2011 and 2012.

The trend of increasing the number of total enrolments of black students continued, rising from 55% in 2012 to 61% in 2013. The number of first-time entering black African students has also shown a steady increase over the same period, with the total enrolment of 59.5% in 2013 being a significant rise from 50% in 2012. Although there has been a concomitant drop in

enrolments of white first-time entering enrolments over the same period – from 48% in 2009 and 2010 to 43% in 2011, 36% in 2012 – this rose marginally to 40.5% in 2013. Similarly, the marked increase in enrolment in master's programmes, from 20 students in 2009 to 52 in 2012, experienced a marginal drop to 48 in 2013.

The academic performance of students in the Faculty remains good, rising from 84% in 2010, to 87.5% in 2012 and remaining relatively stable at 86% in 2013. Overall first-year success rates showed a slight drop from 79.8% in 2012 to 78.7% in 2013. Of some concern is the drop in first-year black African success rates from 76% in 2012 to 72.8% in 2013. The overall performance of black African undergraduate students dropped slightly from 82% in 2012 to 80.7% in 2013.

There were 234 (191 unique) undergraduate modules taught in the Faculty in 2013. Undergraduate module pass rates in all departments were generally above 65%, with only 13 modules achieving a pass rate below 65%. Module throughput rates (success rates) improved, with 20 modules reflecting throughput rates of less than 65% (as compared to 21 in 2012) and 11 of these reflecting a throughput rate of 60% or less. Overall, 192 undergraduate modules reflected a throughput above 75%, a substantial improvement on 132 modules in 2012. There has also been a steady increase in graduation rates, with a total of 362 graduates being awarded their qualifications in 2013 compared to 313

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The Faculty continued to provide support to its students through ongoing initiatives such as the First-Year Seminar, an extended system of tutors for first-year students and special assistance to at-risk students, the First-Year Experience (FYE) programme, onsite writing tutors and special recognition of students' achievements. Tutoring was successfully augmented by the deployment of additional tutors funded by the Management Executive Committee (MEC) strategic fund.

Where necessary, students were referred to appropriate support services. Given the perennial problem of difficulties with mastering the skills of academic writing, concerted efforts were made to encourage students to visit the Writing Centre once they had been referred there. Other initiatives aimed at curriculum enrichment included continuing the inter-disciplinary Green Design Week project, instituting a number of other interdisciplinary and collaborative projects and promoting an ongoing roster of lectures and presentations, both by members of staff and guest speakers from industry and academia, aimed at exposing students to wider socio-economic, environmental and cultural issues.

Students from the Faculty gained national and international recognition through their creative achievements during the year in the many awards and prizes they continued to garner in competitions. Some of the noteworthy competitions in which FADA students

featured in 2013 included: The Corobrick Architectural Students' Awards; the Des Baker Architectural Awards; the Fuchs Foundation Award; the Food Technology 2013 Student Competition; the Assegai Awards; the 35th Annual Loerie Awards; the IndiAfrica Poster Competition; the Cobra Tap Competition; the Association of Rotational Moulders of Southern Africa (ARMSA) and Plastics SA Student Design Competition 2013; the Plastics Institute of South Africa (PISA), Plastics SA, Pet Plastic Recycling South Africa (PETCO) and Afrimold Student Design Competition 2013; the Caesarstone Competition; the Carst and Walker Office Design Competition; the Anglo Gold AuDITIONS Competition; the Anglo American Plat Africa Awards; the Thuthuka lewellery Awards; the Thami Mnyele Ekurhuleni Awards; the ABSA l'Atelier Awards; and the Sasol New Signatures Competition. Whitney Richardson, a BTech student in Interior Design, was selected as one of the students to represent the University at the U21 Student Conference in Amsterdam.

Students' interests were addressed at the FADA Student Forum and in departmental representatives' meetings. Items dealt with at the quarterly Student Forum meetings, chaired by the Dean, included academic matters, Faculty administration related to the student life cycle, Faculty events, student life and student concerns. With the Dean's encouragement, the Student Forum initiated an 'open mic' initiative, which brought students together from the Faculty and elsewhere in the University in a friendly competition to

show off their performing and musical talents. Thanks to this initiative, the 2013 Student Forum achieved a high level of visibility and buy-in from their peers, and overall, students expressed high levels of satisfaction with their experience of the Faculty.

The Faculty's Top Achievers were celebrated at a gala dinner organised for students on the Dean's Merit List, and the Dean also hosted a lunch for the winners of the Green Week collaborative project.



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# ACADEMIC PROGRAMME AND CURRICULUM DEVELOPMENTS



The introduction of a degree track, which is to be implemented across the Faculty over the next few years, continued to enjoy priority in terms of academic programme and curriculum development in 2013. The first cohort of BA Industrial Design students entered this programme in 2013, and the BA Honours (Design), available to students from the Departments of Graphic Design, Jewellery Design and Manufacture, and Multimedia received final approval from the Higher Education Quality Committee (HEQC) and the South African Qualifications Authority (SAQA) for implementation in 2014. The HEQC also approved the MA Design, which will be offered for the first time in 2015. The proposed degree programme in Multimedia, the BA Design (Digital Media) was approved by Senate, and awaits final approval from the HEQC for implementation in 2015. Substantial progress was also made in developing submissions for degree programmes in Interior Design, Fashion Design and Visual Art for implementation in 2016. The BA Visual Art is being developed in such a way that it will enable students to do BA subjects in Humanities, while also making the History of Art component of the Visual Arts degree available to BA students in Humanities as a major. It is envisioned that this will in time lead to the development of a fully-fledged History of Art programme in the Faculty.

The third-year curriculum of the academic major Art and Design for students in the Faculty of Education was successfully introduced in 2013.

As in previous years, the theme of citizenship was entrenched and evaluated as an integral component of identified modules in all undergraduate programmes. Other mechanisms to ensure the relevance of curricula content in module offerings in the Faculty were: teaching collaborations with industry, the revision of modules by Departments to meet identified needs, greater utilisation of Edulink facilities, engagement with international benchmarks and precedents, engagement with the UJ technology mandate and the ongoing completion of teaching and module evaluations conducted by the Centre for Professional Academic Staff Development (CPASD).

The Faculty's Teaching and Learning Forum, which in the past had foregrounded the unique characteristics of teaching and learning in the creative disciplines, was somewhat less active in 2013. This is due to one of its key members, Mr Terence Fenn, withdrawing from the Forum in order to focus on preparations for a PhD. Nonetheless, the Forum continued to host seminars focusing on the development of a community of lecturers who would seek to generate research and scholarship directly from their own teaching practices. In 2014 the Forum's activities will become part and parcel of the Faculty's engagement with the University's

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#### RESEARCH AND CREATIVE PRODUCTION



FYE and newly implemented Senior-Year Experience (SYE) initiatives.

Preliminary figures indicate that the Faculty showed an improvement of 136% on the 2012 figures, producing a total of 45.74 subsidy units. This is a substantial increase on the 35.48 units produced in 2012, and restores the upward trajectory of accredited output of the past few years, from 27.75 units in 2010 to 40.78 units in 2011. The 2013 output comprised 20.5 journal article units, 8.25 conference proceeding units, 11.41 book units, and 1.4 book chapter subsidy units. While most of the output continued to come, as in previous years, from fellows associated with the Faculty Research Centre, there has been a steady increase in output from academic staff in the Faculty. This is partly the consequence of a more liberal approach to supporting requests for funding from the Faculty Research Committee, and partly of a new strategy that seeks to build a closer relationship between the activities of the Research Centre and academic staff in the Faculty.

The appointment in the Faculty of Prof. Brenda Schmahmann, a B2-rated art historian formerly of Rhodes University, as a Professor with Research Specialisation brought a new lustre to the Faculty's research profile. Not only has Prof. Schmahmann made a significant individual contribution

of 5.43 units to the 2013 research output (including 4.18 units for a book entitled Picturing Change: Curating Visual Culture at Post-Apartheid Universities published by Wits University Press), she has also, at the Dean's behest, been active in engaging with both fledgling and established researchers in the Faculty in order to stimulate more research activity. The appointment of Professors Schmahmann and Freschi also doubles the number of NRF-rated researchers in the Faculty, from two (Professors Osman and Berman) to four.

As befits a Faculty of Art, Design and Architecture, creative work continued to enjoy high priority amongst the artists, designers and architects on the academic staff. Five projects for the recognition of creative work as research underwent a peer review process and were successfully submitted to the faculty Research Committee (FRC) and subsequently to an ad hoc committee of the University Research Committee (URC). For the first time since the implementation of the principle of recognition of creative work as research, the University has formally agreed to fund the subsidies payable to successful applicants from URC rather than Faculty funds. This is a significant step forward, and puts the University on a par with its peer institutions, while also increasing the subsidy amount payable to individual researchers. It is envisioned that

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In addition to the projects that were officially recognised by the ad hoc committee of the URC, members of staff participated in six solo or duo exhibitions and 70 group exhibitions (including exhibitions curated by staff members) nationally and internationally, and completed 14 design projects, giving a total of 96 creative outputs for the year, compared to a total of 95 creative outputs in 2012.

Other significant staff achievements included Ken Stucke from the Architecture Department being awarded the prestigious Enviropaedia Eco-Innovation Award for his 'House Jones', and Prof Karen von Veh from Visual Art being invited to be the keynote speaker at the International Association of Art Critics (AICA) conference in Slovakia, funded by the Getty Institute.

The Research Centre, Visual Identities in Art and Design (VIAD), continued its programme of specialist conferences and colloquia. Principal amongst these was an international colloquium entitled 'WHITEWASH 1: Negotiating Whiteness in 21st Century South Africa'. Hosted over two days, the conference brought together South African and international scholars working across various disciplines whose work advances a critical understanding of ways in which notions of whiteness are constructed in post-apartheid South Africa. Collectively, their contributions to the field point to the emergence of

a fledgling South African whiteness studies. The conference attracted significant amounts of public and academic interest, and, given its controversial thematics, generated substantive media publicity and robust debate both during and after the event.

VIAD also hosted a one-day colloquium entitled 'Jozi Fashion Threads I. Interference: theorising fashion design practice as process'. This colloquium focused on the three components integral to fashion design practice: fashion design as activity (process); the fashion designer (actor); and fashion design as object (end product). The keynote speakers were Regine Steenbock (Suim Design, Hamburg and Berlin) and Dr Sonja Narunsky-Laden (Senior Lecturer, UJ Department of Communications), and included one international video presentation and two international attendees.

The FADA Gallery continued to promote the profile of the Faculty by hosting nine student and professional exhibitions. Highlights included the annual alumni exhibition, hosted in 2013 by Industrial Design, on the theme of 'Thinking Design', and an international touring exhibition of 3D printed design and artwork entitled 'Agents of the 3D Revolution'. This exhibition generated national media coverage, and brought a number of high-profile visitors and industry stakeholders to the Faculty. The FADA Gallery, under the energetic stewardship of part-time curator Mariapaola McGurk, actively embraced social media in promoting its events, and initiated a dynamic collaboration with UI Arts and Culture in co-hosting an exhibition entitled 'Critically Queer' as part of the latter's 'That's So Gay' festival.

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# COMMUNITY SERVICE AND STAKEHOLDER ENGAGEMENTS

FADA continued a working relationship with the Central Johannesburg College (CJC), a Further Education and Training (FET) college whose arts and culture campus is located in the vicinity of Crown Mines, by allowing representatives from CJC to observe our first-year selection process and to interview prospective students who did not meet our criteria. Two B Tech Fine Art students also completed their workplace learning commitment with first-year CJC classes, and a senior member of the staff of the Visual Arts Department served as an external moderator at CJC. We will continue to build this relationship in 2014 by exploring the possibilities of involving CJC students in a first-year collaborative citizenship education project.

The FADA Open Day and school visits succeeded both in providing information and counselling to prospective students, and in drawing learners, teachers and parents to the Faculty during the year. Industry stakeholders were invited by the Dean to a series of cocktail receptions hosted in the FADA Gallery during the exhibition of the FADA Student Showcase at the beginning of the year. As part of the strategic drive to build the Faculty's visibility and stature, the Dean was instrumental in establishing the Faculty as the academic partner of the Johannesburg Art Fair. This gave

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**Executive Summary** 

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FADA and the University considerable exposure, both in the printed and other media that accompanied this highprofile event, and through a series of public panel discussions, chaired by the Dean, in which a number of South African and international experts debated questions relating to the collecting of contemporary African art.

In order both to promote the Faculty and to foster closer alignment with the University's values, the Dean initiated a series of public lectures, to be continued in 2014, in which prominent public intellectuals in the fields of art and design are invited to address the core values of the University as they relate to the creative disciplines. In the first semester, Prof. Gerrit Olivier, a Professor in the Wits School of Arts and former Dean of the Faculty of Humanities at Wits, gave a lecture on the theme of 'Imagination',

entitled 'Does imagination have a place in the Academy?' In the second semester, Prof. Edgar Pieterse, Director of the African Centre for Cities and Research Chair in Urban Policy at the University of Cape Town, spoke to the theme of 'Regeneration' in a lecture entitled 'Can regeneration save the city?' Both events were widely publicised and well attended, with the lectures being podcast after the event on the FADA website.

In this and other ways the Faculty ramped up its efforts to establish and entrench its presence and profile among all its stakeholders. All public events were publicised through various forms of media, including listings on the UJ and FADA websites and on external websites and social networks. The FADA Facebook page gained 1,500 subscribers (compared to 740 in 2012), while the FADA Twitter

account became increasingly active, with 900 followers by the end of 2013.

The informal INTERACT@FADA internal news email was sent to staff every month. In this way Faculty staff were kept informed of activities taking place within the Faculty and elsewhere in the University. In order to better promote internal communication, the Dean sent regular communiqués to all staff in the form of an email circular entitled 'From the Dean's Desk', in which he commented on strategic issues and celebrated individual and Faculty achievements. As a further step towards promoting Faculty activities to both internal and external stakeholders, a vitrine was installed in the foyer of the FADA building in which members of staff were invited to post news of their research and creative achievements.

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#### RESOURCE MANAGEMENT



The Faculty had a total of 66 permanent and full-time contract members of staff in 2013. This comprised 47 academic staff (including the Dean), nine support staff, five administrative officers, three members in Academic Administration, a marketing coordinator, and the Dean's personal assistant.

The academic staff comprised 47% senior lecturers, 40% lecturers, 9% associate professors, and 4% professors. The percentage of associate professors improved from 8% in 2012 to 9% in 2013, while the senior lecturer category increased from 43% in 2012 to 47% in 2013. The percentage of staff in non-designated groups changed from 76% in 2012 to 62% in 2013. The percentage of designated non-academic staff members remained constant at 68% as did the Faculty Management Committee at 33% designated and 67% non-designated members.

Overall, the upgrading of staff qualifications progressed well. The level of academic qualifications of staff in the Faculty shifted upwards in 2013, with 89% of staff holding a master's or doctoral qualification compared to 79% in 2012, 76% in 2011 and 68% in 2010. The number of staff with doctorates increased from 14% in 2012 to 21% in 2013. Leora Farber, the Director of the FADA Research Centre, was awarded her doctorate in the first part of 2013, and towards the end of the year two members of staff, Justine Hunkin from Industrial Design and Carol Lavelle from Fashion Design, completed their master's qualifications. Lizette Hollander, the Head of Faculty Administration, also completed

her master's qualification. All staff members not yet holding a master's qualification in 2013 were registered for further studies, and their progress carefully monitored.

The focus on training and development during the year was on capacity building in writing for publication, postgraduate study, postgraduate supervision, discipline-specific software applications and teaching and learning. The Research Centre also hosted a colloquium, well attended by Faculty staff, focusing on practice-led research.

The second phase of the upgrading of ventilation and temperature control in the building was implemented, with a focus on teaching venues. While this has afforded some relief in parts of the building, problems with ventilation and temperature control persist, particularly in the staff offices and common rooms on the second floor of the building. This remains a source of frustration for staff and students alike.

The drive to encourage Faculty staff and students to be mindful of caring for the working environment continued. Campus maintenance and operations was ensured by means of monthly meetings with, and the ongoing reporting of matters requiring attention to, the office of the Campus Director. Initiatives in the areas of sustainability and energy efficiency were actively promoted, with the use of recycling bins and the continued move towards a paperless meeting environment throughout the Faculty.

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
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All departments have a variety of well-functioning quality assurance mechanisms in place. The Academic Planning and Quality Committee (APQC) continued to devote a great deal of time to ensuring that all new academic offerings met requisite standards. The APQC also dealt successfully with the review of readmissions, F7 exclusions, and recommendations for granting credits and status before these matters served at Faculty Board. The Faculty Board and various other Faculty committees received positive evaluations.

In keeping with the schedule of the University's Unit for Quality Promotion, two Departments – Graphic Design and

Architecture – were peer reviewed in 2013 in order to ensure the quality and relevance of their programmes. In the case of Architecture, this was also to gain accreditation of its programmes from the South African Council for the Architectural Profession (SACAP), the statutory body regulating the practice and education of architecture in South Africa. The review panels for both Departments were externally constituted with a mix of local, national and international panel members. All teaching programmes in these Departments were reviewed, and the Departments received feedback that highlighted areas of strength as well as areas for development. Developmental plans based on the recommendations

of these reviews will be submitted in 2014 to the Faculty Academic Planning and Quality Assurance Committee. SACAP also awarded full accreditation of the programmes offered by the Department of Architecture. Endorsed by the international body, the Commonwealth Association of Architects, this is an important validation that underscores the professional standing and status of the architectural programmes in the Faculty.

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to determine whether it should continue to receive URC funding for the next cycle. The review panel was unanimous in commending the Research Centre for the work that it has done over the past five years in promoting high-level debate in terms of its thematics, and for forging new ground in the area of practice-led research in South African visual arts. It noted that the Centre has, through prolific scholarly publication and the hosting of international conferences, curated exhibitions and the like, achieved a significant national profile. As one of the reviewers, Prof. Bhekizizwe Peterson, Professor and Head of African Literature at the University of the Witwatersrand put it, "The Centre is definitely a national beacon and needs to be commended for that". In the final analysis, the review committee was unanimous in strongly supporting the Centre and its application for continued funding.

Student and academic data were well managed and Academic Administration maintained an excellent record. Key performance indicators in all functions were highly rated in the audits conducted regularly by Central Academic Administration.

The Risk Register was updated as required. High-risk areas continue to be the preparedness and attitude of entry-level students, the loss of prospective and preferred students, and the physical working environment. Appropriate actions were taken where possible in mitigating these risks. Areas of particular concern for departments remain the attraction of qualified staff, particularly from designated groups, while issues of poor ventilation, temperature control and noise levels in the building continue to have a negative impact on the perception of the working environment by staff and students alike. The lack of office space is also an area of concern, particularly as regards being able to accommodate postdoctoral research fellows (PDRFs). Given the rising stature of the Research Centre and its ability to attract PDRFs, it is important that this is resolved.

Overall, the Faculty functioned at a high level of effectiveness in 2013, and indeed in many areas is going from strength to strength. It appears to be well positioned to realise its vision of becoming a leading centre of excellence in tertiary art and design education in Johannesburg, aligned with the University's ambitions of attaining global excellence and stature.

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
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




#### NATURE AND SCOPE OF THE FACULTY

The Faculty of Art, Design and Architecture comprises eight academic departments. In 2013 the Faculty offered 17 undergraduate programmes (including pipeline programmes), comprising nine NDips, three Diplomas and 12 undergraduate degrees (ten BTechs and two BAs), with a total of 223 modules across both under- and postgraduate programmes. Five departments offered Master's programmes. A total of 1,284 students were enrolled for undergraduate and postgraduate studies in 2013. The Faculty employed 66 permanent full-time staff consisting of 47 academic staff (including the Dean), nine support staff, five administrative officers, three members in Academic Administration, a marketing coordinator, and the Dean's personal assistant. The Faculty is located in a dedicated building with customised studios, computer laboratories and workshops to suit the specific needs of disciplines and departments. The FADA Library, auditorium, lecture halls and Design Café, all located within the faculty building, provide students and staff with conveniently situated facilities.


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practices through a system of interlocking committees, effective channels of communication and the coordination of Faculty actions with the University's strategy and objectives. Appropriate committees oversaw the formulation of strategic objectives and the development of and adherence to Faculty procedures and guidelines.

The Dean's Committee, comprising Heads of Department (HOD), the Head of Faculty Administration (HFA) and the Faculty Marketer, met on a monthly basis as an integrative and decisionmaking forum. These meetings dealt with matters determined by relevant policies and imperatives

The Faculty ensured good management as well as day-to-day operations. An advisory sub-committee of three departmental heads and the Vice-Dean met with the Dean to consider human resource items such as promotions and performance appraisal when necessary. A weekly meeting of the Dean, Vice-Dean and HFA ensured the timely consideration of academic administrative matters and set out a planning schedule for the week ahead. These meetings also established a direct communication link between the activities and initiatives of Central Academic Administration and the Faculty.

> Other faculty operational committees (Library, Health and Safety, Marketing

and Students' Forum) convened on a quarterly basis with ad hoc meetings scheduled when necessary. The minutes of all committees were tabled at Faculty Board meetings for approval of pertinent issues, noting and discussion as appropriate. A monthly meeting attended by the Dean and two Faculty representatives with the Campus Director, maintenance, protection services and occupational safety staff enabled the identification and resolution of specified issues in the FADA building. A FADA Gallery steering committee consisting of the Dean, the curator and a Faculty representative met at regular intervals to deal with matters related to the planning and management of the gallery.

### STRATEGIC OBJECTIVES

The Faculty of Art, Design and Architecture continued to enhance its reputation in 2013, in alignment with the strategic goals of the University of Johannesburg. Key objectives outlined in 2012 were:

- a focus on building a competitive and relevant programme mix and offering;
- a continued contribution to the technology drive;
- enhancing the staff profile in terms of qualifications and development;
- promoting and sustaining excellence and relevance in teaching and learning;

- nurturing an environment conducive to research and creative production;
- advancing Faculty recognition in alignment with University's strategic drivers;
- ensuring operational efficiency and institutional culture;
- continued engagement with community service.

The Faculty made excellent progress in all these areas, while also engaging actively with the new vision and energy brought by a change in management. In June 2013 all full-time staff, both academic and administrative, came together for the first time as a group

to discuss the Faculty's vision, mission and strategy in order to align these with the University's emerging 'Global Excellence and Stature' strategy. Discussions focused on:

- the relevance and depth of FADA's academic offerings, research, and community engagement;
- building FADA's brand, identity, reputation and stature; and
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The imperatives that emerged from this discussion included:

- The attraction and retention of top students; meeting the changing needs of industries in terms of curriculum content; enabling postgraduate studies; facilitating growth in strategic areas; investigating international precedents as directives for future development; ensuring compliance with the Higher Education Qualifications Sub-Framework (HEQSF); and continuing to work towards a comprehensive Programme Qualifications Mix (PQM).
- Enhancing research and creative output; strengthening research enablers and catalysts in the Faculty; extending the profile and capacity of the Visual Identities in Art and

- Design (VIAD) Research Centre nationally and internationally.
- Profiling and strengthening technology programmes and achievements.
- Encouraging student participation in national and international competitions.
- Continuing to promote the research cluster 'Design for Social Development' through support for appropriate projects, multidisciplinary and collaborative partnerships and industry connections.
- Ongoing publicity initiatives to maintain public presence and to contribute to developing brand identity and Faculty reputation.
- Promoting the creative profile of the Faculty through strategic connections with high-profile

national events such as Design Indaba; maintaining a dynamic FADA Gallery programme, and leveraging the VIAD Research Centre's growing reputation and recognition.

The Faculty made steady progress in realising these objectives, while being responsive to the changing strategic imperatives of the University in relation to the pursuit of global excellence and stature. Performance in each of the identified areas is discussed throughout the chapters of this report with the final chapter exploring the implications of these strategic drivers for future planning to 2016 and beyond.

# GOVERNANCE AND QUALITY MANAGEMENT

A range of mechanisms were employed to ensure the maintenance of good governance and academic quality management. These included quality committees, defined quality assurance routes, the formulation and implementation of policies and procedures in alignment with institutional directives, reporting systems and external reviews and audits.

Three Faculty committees and Eight departmental committees

are responsible for ensuring that acceptable academic standards are upheld and prescribed policy and procedures complied with. Quality committees and academic quality assurance routes are set out in figure 2.2.

### Faculty Board

The Faculty Board convened as scheduled on the Faculty's academic calendar in 2013. In addition, one Special Faculty Board was called in February to gain Faculty approval of

the points-based system for academic promotion minimum appointment and promotion criteria for academic employees. Attendance of meetings continued to be excellent with 80% to 85% attendance. Guest presentations were made during the year by Prof A Parekh, Deputy Vice-Chancellor Academic; Dr R Bawa, Executive Director: Library; Mrs E de Wet and Mr I Meyer from the Office of the Registrar; and Mr Z Khubheka from the Centre for Psychological Services and Career Development (PsyCad).

# Academic Planning and Quality Committee (APQC)

The Academic Planning and Quality Committee (APQC) met six times during 2013. The Committee devoted a great deal of time to ensuring that academic offerings are aligned to the HEQSF and academic amendments met requisite standards. New programmes that were developed and recommended for approval by Faculty Board included the

Dip Architecture, the B Architecture, the BA Design (Multimedia Design) and the MA Design. Further development of the Honours in Industrial Design continued, and discussions commenced on a B degree in Fashion Design.

Category B programmes were aligned and submitted to the Programme Working Group. The Departmental Selection Criteria were reviewed.

Faculty reviews were a standard item on the agenda. Two Departments, of Architecture and Graphic Design, were successfully reviewed by external peer reviewers in 2013. In the case of Architecture, this included professional accreditation by the South African Council for the Architectural Profession (SACAP). The members of the review panels, which included international reviewers on each panel, were approved by the APQC. External

moderators for all undergraduate modules were approved as presented in table 1.1. The APQC also successfully dealt with the consideration of re-admission and F7 exclusions, recommendations for granting credits and status, and issues of plagiarism.

## Faculty Research Committee (FRC)

The Faculty Research Committee met five times during the year. In addition to considering requests for research funding, the Committee reviewed the viability and standard of proposals for research projects and postgraduate study, considered the appointment of supervisors and external examiners and considered applications for funding. Bi-annual supervisors' reports and reports on

funded research projects allowed the Committee to monitor the progress and achievement of stated objectives. The supervisor's report further assisted the Committee in monitoring postgraduate management in academic departments which included regular consultation with students and satisfactory progress. An updated database of all registered postgraduate students served as a standing item at all meetings and provided members with an overview of the status of students in the Faculty.

Assessment committees were convened to consider external examiners' reports under the direction of a non-examining/ non-supervising chair to make recommendations to postgraduate supervisors and students.

A somewhat more liberal approach to the requests for research funding enabled 11 members of staff to receive funding for their research projects, to a total value of R143,018.44.

In order to better serve the strategic imperatives of research development, on the one hand, and postgraduate student development on the other, in June 2013 the decision was taken to unbundle the postgraduate student function from the FRC, and to establish a separate Faculty Higher Degrees Committee (FHDC). Following Faculty Board approval of the revised charters for these two new committees, they will operate separately from 2014.

The results from these questionnaires are discussed with the individual lecturer and the HoD. Where issues are noted, plans are put in place to remedy such issues.

# Department of Interior Design Module co-ordinators

Develop module content, implement the offering of the module and ensure that teaching and learning process adheres to the rule and regulations of the Faculty and University. This includes close monitoring of student performance.

#### Year co-ordinators

In 2013, the Departmental Committee developed a new bachelor of Arts in Interior Design. The programme was presented to the APQC in end December 2013.

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

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#### 3.1 EMPLOYEE PROFILE

#### 3.1.1 Composition

The Faculty had a total of 66 permanent and full-time contract staff members in 2012. This comprised 47 academic staff, 16 support staff, three members in Academic Administration, a marketing coordinator, the Dean and his personal assistanth. Senior lecturers constituted 47% of academic staff, lecturers 40%, associate professors 8% and two professor positions 4%.

During the year, three academic appointments were made. Mr KA Stucke was appointed as a senior lecturer in the Department of Architecture, Ms R Cook was appointed as a lecturer in the Department of Graphic Design and Miss E Meiring as a senior lecturer in the Department of Interior Design. Prof B Schmahmann was appointed as a professsor with research specialisation in the FADA Research Office and Prof F Freschi replaced Prof M Sauthoff as Executive Dean. Two staff members resigned, Ms M Silverman from the Department of Architecture and Dr K Ramdass from the Department of Fashion Design.

Details of permanent full-time staff are provided in tables 4.1, 4.2, 4.3 and 4.4 below. A comprehensive list of part-time appointments made in 2013 is provided in Appendix 8. These appointments ranged from one-hour guest lecturers to eleven-month temporary appointments. Positions and functions fulfilled included teaching, tutoring, student assistants, management of computer laboratories, models for drawing classes, assistance with course developments, research and report writing and editorial services. Appointments were funded by vacant posts and the part-time salary budget.

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Figure 3.1: Composition of full-time academic employees as a percentage



Figure 3.1: Composition of full-time academic employees as a percentage



Although the Faculty's current equity profile has improved, it is still of concern. Several factors currently inhibit the ability to attract lecturers from the designated groups, though. These include a competitive employment environment with a small pool of potential applicants, and the slow delivery of postgraduate qualifications from tertiary institutions.

Departments in the Faculty periodically scan comparable departments in peer institutions with a view to benchmarking employee profiles. Recent benchmarking reports from the faculty management indicate the following:

#### Fashion

VUT is predominantly staffed by white female, TUT is predominantly staffed with black female and male whereas CPUT has one black female staff member. The department currently has one Indian male and one indian female official full-time academic staff. Part-time academic staff and tutors include black male and indian female.

#### **Interior Design**

A benchmarking exercise, performed in 2012 between seven similar programmes across the country, indicated that only two institutions have equity candidates appointed in lecturing positions. They are Tshwane University of Technology and Durban University of Technology.

A small number of lecturers, which fall within the equity category, are currently appointed in Interior Design education in South Africa. Although significant progress has been made in delivering graduates from designated groups in the Department Interior Design at FADA, very few progress to the BTech level. A minimum of a Master's qualification in Interior Design is required to be considered for full-time employment.

### 3.1.3 Academic qualifications

Overall, the upgrading of staff qualifications progressed well. The level of academic qualifications of staff in the Faculty shifted upwards in 2013, with 89% of staff holding a master's or doctoral qualification compared to 79% in 2012, 76% in 2011 and 68% in 2010. The number of staff with doctorates increased from 14% in 2012 to 21% in 2013. Leora Farber, the Director of the FADA Research Centre, was awarded her doctorate in the first part of 2013, and towards the end of the year two members of staff, Justine Hunkin from Industrial Design and Carol Lavelle from Fashion Design, completed their master's qualifications. Lizette Hollander, the Head of Faculty Administration, also completed her master's qualification. All staff members not yet holding a master's qualification in 2013 were registered for further studies, and their progress carefully monitored.

Figure 3.2: Academic qualifications of academic employees 2011 – 2013



Figure 3.2: Academic qualifications of academic employees 2011 – 2013





### **4.1 ENROLMENT FIGURES**

A total headcount enrolment of 1,228 undergraduate and 48 postgraduate students were enrolled in the programmes offered by the Faculty. This is an increase in total headcount enrolments from 1,112 in 2010, 1,160 in 2011 and 1,159 in 2012. International student enrolments have remained static at 42, 42 and 41 respectively over the last three years. Masters enrolments increased from 37 in 2011 to 47 in 2012 and 48 in 2013 largely due to the introduction of the coursework Masters in Architecture in 2011 and entry into the subsequent years of this programme. The introduction of the BA degrees since 2011 contributed to the increase in undergraduate degrees with BA Industrial Design introduced in 2013. BTech degrees have remained relatively stable, although Graphic Design and Multimedia have shown a slight decline due to the significant increase in enrolments in the BA (Design) (Communication Design) degree. Diplomas in Architecture and Multimedia continued to show steady growth, in keeping with the Faculty's strategic growth plan. Diplomas in Fashion Production, Jewellery Design and Manufacture and Interior design replaced the National Diplomas in 2013, causing a shift in the enrolment numbers.

## 4.2 STUDENT EQUITY AND GENDER PROFILE

There has been a gradual increase in total Black enrolments from 48% in 2009 and 2010 to 51%, 55% and 60% in 2011, 2012 and 2013 respectively. Black first-time entering students showed a similar increase from 52% in 2010 to 57%, 64% and 65% in 2011, 2012 and 2013 respectively. First-time entering African students increased from 41% to 41%, 44%, 51% and 51% of total first-time enrolments over the five-year period, while White first-time entering enrolments dropped from 48% in 2009 and 2010, 43% in 2011 to 36% in 2012 and 35% in 2013. White postgraduate enrolments increased from 77% in 2011 and 69% in 2012 to 84% in 2013. Total female enrolments have remained marginally higher than male enrolments over the last three years, with enrolment constant at 54%. Postgraduate female enrolments have recovered considerably over the three-year period from 49% and 44% to 63%. This is largely due to higher female registration in Fashion and Fine Art masters students.

Figure 4.1: First-time entering enrolments per race 2019 - 2013





### 4.6 PROGRAMME AND MODULE DEVELOPMENTS

Programme development continues to receive high priority in the Faculty, with the introduction of a degree track in most Departments scheduled to be implemented over the next few years.

In 2013, Diploma offerings were aligned to the HEQSF requirements and academic amendments met requisite standards for implementation in 2013. Category B programmes were aligned and submitted to the Programme Working Group.

New programmes that were developed and recommended for approval by Faculty Board included the Dip Architecture, the B Architecture, the BA Design (Multimedia Design) and the MA Design. Further development of the Honours in Industrial Design continued, and discussions commenced on a B degree in Fashion Design.

The third year of the academic major entitled Art and Design for students in the Faculty of Education was introduced, with the first year modules implemented in 2011 and second year modules in 2012. The theme of citizenship was integrated into identified modules in all undergraduate programmes. The Faculty ensured curriculum content of modules remained relevant through initiatives such as teaching collaborations with industry, regular industry guest speakers invitations, the revision of modules by departments to meet identified needs, including the UJ technology mandate.

The papermaking workshop symbolized the synergy amongst the 3 participating art departments and the need to expand creative endeavour.

### 4.8 STUDENT EXPERIENCE

### 4.8.1 Orientation and First Year Experience (FYE)

In keeping with the importance placed by the University on the successful integration of new students into university life, ensuring a positive first year experience at the University is a Faculty priority. Strong emphasis is placed on Orientation, which is seen as an ideal opportunity to set the tone for incoming students' academic experience. Orientation sessions at the 2013 First Year Seminar were divided into four sections, namely, general information about the University and Faculty, academic registration procedures, Departmental information and training sessions. A separate information session for parents was also held. Senior students were involved in the activities where appropriate.

The Faculty participated in all FYE activities scheduled by Academic Development and Support. Minutes of the FYE Committee were served at the Dean's Committee for noting and discussion. First year coordinators from academic departments met on a quarterly basis to exchange views and to be informed of relevant developments. First year coordinators ensured that the interests of first year students were addressed.

### 4.8.2 Curriculum enrichment

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### 4.8.2 Curriculum enrichment

Ongoing initiatives aimed at curriculum enrichment included Green Design Week, a number of multidisciplinary and collaborative projects, and a series of "Friday Talks" and Industry Lectures by guest speakers which exposed students to wider social, cultural, environmental and economic issues. Further details of these initiatives are provided in Chapter 4.

### 4.8.3 Students' Forum

Students' interests were dealt with in the Students' Forum and in departmental representatives' meetings. Items dealt with at the quarterly Forum meetings, chaired by the Dean, included academic matters, Faculty administration related to the student life cycle, Faculty events, student life and student concerns. With the Dean's encouragement, the Student Forum initiated a quarterly 'open mic' at the Design Café, which proved very popular amongst students from FADA and beyond. Overall, students expressed high levels of satisfaction although ventilation in the building, access to the building after hours and printing facilities continued to be flagged as areas of concern.

### 4.8.4 Online social networks

The INTERACT @ FADA (student version) internal newsletter was sent to class representatives once a month. The newsletter provided information on Faculty activities and acknowledged student achievements. Students were also encouraged to join the FADA Facebook and Twitter pages. A number of academic departments also established very active Facebook groups for their departments. Live Twitter feeds were streamed at exhibition openings and other public events, with students being encouraged to participate.

### 4.8.5 Dean's Merit List and UJ Top Achievers

The Faculty's Top Achievers were included in the programme organised for students on the Dean's Merit List. Activities for the Dean's List included a gala awards dinner where students received certificates and gifts, and priority invitations to Faculty events.

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# 4.9 FADA CREATIVE TEACHING AND LEARNING FORUM REPORT FOR 2013

On 29 July, educators Guy Michel Telemaque and Dara Bayer from Boston Academy were hosted by the forum through the kind efforts of Professor Kim Berman. Boston Arts Academy, a pilot school within the Boston Public Schools, is charged with being a laboratory and a beacon for artistic and academic innovation. Boston Arts Academy prepares a diverse community of aspiring artist-scholars to be successful in their college or professional careers and to be engaged members of a democratic society. The Center for Arts in Education is BAA's professional development, dissemination, research and advocacy arm. Dara Bayer and Guy Michel Telemaque (along with students Tavi Francis, Aaron Clanton, and Perla Ledesma) introduced the Boston Arts Academy through a short video and discussion. Topics covered included a history of the school and how its evolution has impacted the roles of the Headmaster, faculty and staff. In addition, the presenters discussed their work with developing a framing philosophy called Habits of the Graduate and how these terms and concepts guided their teaching, learning and assessment in arts and academic classrooms. The session was well attended and the conversation with the presenters focused on issues on learner identity in arts education.

On 26 August, Salim Vally, director of the Centre for Education Rights and Transformation and an Associate Professor at the Faculty of Education presented a paper entitled "critical pedagogy, social injustice and the role of the academy". Vally is also the coordinator of the Education Rights Project and worked as a senior researcher at Wits University's Education Policy Unit for 13 years. Vally's presentation linked his thinking on the arts to his academic interests in education, social policy, social class, transformation, social justice, human rights and democracy; critical and liberatory pedagogies; teacher education and development; curriculum issues. The presentation thus incorporated the pivotal role of the creative arts play in social justice and critical pedagogy using the educational philosopher Maxine Greene's metaphor of opening apertures. The presentation was very well-attended and introduced critical pedagogical theories into a Faculty that already has an established interest in social and development projects. Vally's visit also prompted potential collaborations between his center and Farieda Nazier's creative production in 2014 and Brenden Gray's education research in 2014.

Selected academics at FADA with research interests in education were invited to attend a special session on 14 October to discuss the possibility of launching a Faculty wide research initiative in Art, Design and Architecture education. The aim of the session on Monday 14 October was to generate a basic project outline, identify publishing opportunities and brainstorm possible themes for such a project. Only three lecturers attended the session and some brainstorming took place around potential research themes for 2014. A handful of other lecturers also expressed through e-mail. However, given the difficulties in establishing a community of practice due to the busy schedules of academics and individual research trajectories that are not necessarily congruent, it was decided to re-strategise in 2014 around creating a community of practice in scholarship of teaching and learning in 2014

An application for budget was also made to the Dean's office for 2014 which included a request to fund inviting high profile educationalists and creatives with an interest in education to give public presentations and FADA around a key set of themes.

## 4.9 FADA CREATIVE TEACHING AND LEARNING FORUM REPORT FOR 2013


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### **5.1 PERFORMANCE OVERVIEW**

Preliminary figures indicate that in 2013 FADA produced a total of 45.74 subsidy units, compared to 35.48 subsidy units in 2012, 40.78 subsidy units in 2011 and 27.75 in 2010. This output included 24.5 journal article units, 8.5 conference proceeding units and 12.74 book and chapter subsidy units. This is a 36% increase in subsidy units compared to the 35.48 units produced in 2012. Details of the 2013 output are outlined in table 5.1, followed by a list of authors and titles in each of the output categories. During the course of the year, members of staff participated in and curated numerous exhibitions, and completed 15 design projects. Two international conferences and a number of local conferences were organised. The Research Centre, Visual Identities in Art and Design (VIAD), exceeded all proposed outputs and performance indicators. The FADA Gallery hosted 11 exhibitions, seven of which featured prominent artists and designers, three which showed the outcomes of teaching programmes in the Faculty and one which displayed the work of matric pupils at Independent Examination Board (IEB) schools. Research capacity-building initiatives included the research seminar series, opportunities to publish in various media, research methodology workshops, reading groups and funding opportunities.



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

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# 5.3 REPORT: FADA RESEARCH CENTRE - VISUAL IDENTITIES IN ART AND DESIGN (VIAD)

#### **STRATEGIC GOALS 2013**

- Working to develop, foster and support research being done by the Research Associates and VIAD staff members; meet target numbers for subsidisable outputs.
- Continued work towards realising VIAD's aims and objectives, as detailed in the VIAD Charter (updated April 2013).
- Active commitment to developing forms of research that promotes a dialogic relationship between theory and practice.
- Continuing ongoing and establishing new research capacity development initiatives within FADA.
- To explore and develop ways in which VIAD can set up meaningful connections with FADA Depts., and extend its reach within the Faculty.
- Active commitment to increasing diversity within VIAD.

#### **VIAD ACTIVITIES 2013**

### Conferences/colloquia/panel discussions hosted by RC

- WHITEWASH 1: Negotiating whiteness in 21st century South Africa, School of Tourism and Hospitality, UJ Bunting Road Campus, 19-20 March. Two-day conference convened by Dr Leora Farber, Dr Nicky Falkof (VIAD post-doc) and Dr Louise Bethlehem (Senior Lecturer in the English Department and the Programme in Cultural Studies at the Hebrew University of Jerusalem). Keynote speakers were Ferial Haffajee (Editor-in-chief of City Press); Prof Sarah Nuttall (Professor of Literary and Cultural Studies and Director of the Wits Institute for Social and Economic Research (WiSER)) and Prof Melissa Steyn (Director of the Wits Centre for Race and Diversity Studies). Dr Bethlehem acted as respondent to the plenary speakers.

The conference brought together a range of South African and international scholars working across various disciplines, whose work advances a critical understanding of ways in which whitenesses are constructed in post-apartheid South Africa. Collectively, their contributions to the field point to the emergence of a fledgling South African whiteness studies. Through the conference, VIAD initiated developments in this nascent field by creating a forum for these existing and emergent critical conversations to take place. WHITEWASH 1 functioned as an open, public space in which difficult and uncomfortable conversations around social and ideological constructions of whitenesses were conducted in a sustained and academically rigorous manner, without sacrificing the exploratory and empathetic.

Speakers interrogated constructs of whitenesses by examining ways in which they are effected in institutions, politics, space, culture, society and lived experience in postapartheid South Africa, and their complex relations to privilege and power. An underpinning thematic was how whiteness, in combination with gender and class, is drawn upon in the construction of new identities, social relations and lived experience. To explore these issues, the conference was structured around panels that involved theoretical considerations of how the legacies of historical whitenesses developed under colonialism and apartheid still have a bearing on the present; emergent white identity constructs in post-apartheid South Africa; ways in which constructs of whiteness play out in contemporary visual culture and the media, and ways in which forms of South African whitenesses are currently being 'reimagined' in cultural production.

Approximately 100 people attended the conference, five of whom were international speakers and three of whom were international attendees. It attracted significant amounts of public and academic interest; generated substantive media publicity and robust debate, both during and post-event (web postings, blogs, and newspaper articles).

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 Jozi Fashion Threads I. Interference: theorising fashion design practice as process, Waterford Restaurant, School of Tourism and Hospitality, UJ Bunting Road Campus, 3 October. One-day colloquium convened by Leora Farber and Desiree Smal. Keynote speakers were **Regine Steenbock** (Suim Design, Hamburg and Berlin) and **Dr Sonja Narunsky-Laden** (Senior Lecturer, UJ Dept of Communications).

The overarching theme of the colloquium centered on the three components integral to fashion design practice: fashion design as activity (process); the fashion designer (actor); and fashion design as object (end product). Each of these components were examined in light of the following: fashion design method; socio-technological process in fashion design; fashion design for development; environmental sustainability in fashion design; ethics and fashion design process or product; economic development and sustainability in fashion design; development and application of technology; consuming fashion and fashion retail.

This was a small-scale colloquium, attended by approximately 30 people. It included one international video presentation and two international attendees. Its primary aim was to serve as a developmental forum for the Fashion Dept. staff to present papers in their specific research focus area (theorising fashion design practice). Five Fashion Design staff members presented full or co-written papers. Two Fashion Design MTechs, J Lucking and C Nascimento, and one Industrial Design BTech, M Monsanto, presented short papers.

Public panel discussion on vernacular studio photography held at NIROXprojects, Arts on Main, 8 August, to accompany Steven Dubin's exhibition, *Developing Characters: Contending Cultures & Creative Commerce in a South African Photography Studio*. Speakers included Vuli Nyoni, Molemo Moilia, Prof Raimi Gabadanosi and Prof Sioma O'Connell; Dr Steven Dubin as respondent. The panel was chaired by Prof Federico Freschi. The panel discussion was well-attended, and gave rise to valuable critical commentary. Papers presented will form the basis of a special edition of Critical Arts on vernacular studio photography, to be published late in 2014/early 2015.

#### Publications edited/special editions of journals edited/co-edited

Guest edited special edition of the South African subsidy-bearing journal *Image & Text* co-edited by L Farber, T Murink and J Sey. Editing and peer-review process is currently underway; the edition is to be published in June 2014.

Jozi Fashion Threads I. Interference: theorising fashion design practice as process conference proceedings, co-edited by L Farber & D Smal. Editing and peer-review process currently underway; proceedings to be published April 2014.

#### RESEARCH CAPACITY DEVELOPMENT INITIATIVES IN FADA

Currently, some of the ways in which the RC is playing a role within the Faculty is through provision of:

Publishing opportunities for staff (in VIAD conference proceedings, *Art South Africa* supplements, special editions of journals edited by the VIAD Director and Research Associates). In many cases, these are platforms that VIAD has created — without the RC, that particular publication platform would not have been available. In cases where staff submitted articles/papers for these publications, a tremendous amount of technical support (for example, extensive editing and restructuring of articles/papers) and conceptual input is provided.

Opportunities for staff and post-grad students to present at, or attend conferences/ colloquia (1-2 per year) with high-level international and South African speakers at FADA at discounted registration rates.

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The benefit of at least one exhibition per annum either curated by VIAD and/or its Research Associates, or hosted by VIAD, usually at the FADA gallery.

Hosting seminars as part of the FADA Research Seminar Series. VIAD hosted 7 FADA Research Series Seminars in 2013:

- 29 April: A head, a minister and three wild horses, presented by Brenda Schmahmann.
- 4 March: Whiteness: methods and motivations, presented by Nicky Falkof.
- 11 February: Autoethnography and design/art narrative research: strategies for emergent conversations, presented by Allan John Munro.
- 27 May: Impilo Mapansula, presented by Daniela Groeller and Cixelo Xaba.
- 15 July: *Developing characters*, presented by Steven Dubin.
- 29 July, Ceramics & the 3D printing revolution in South Africa, presented by Wendy Gers and Michaela Jansen van Vuuren.
- 9 September: The two talking Yonis, presented by Reshma Chhiba and Nontombeko Ntombela.

Presentation of workshops on developing research and writing skills. 7 workshops were held in 2013:

- 3 workshops presented by Fulbright specialist resident in VIAD, Dr Nathaniel Stern, 17, 18 & 21 January. 45 FADA staff members and 4 MTech students attended, and the majority came to all three. The workshops provided the context and base skills for research, grantwriting, collaboration, and publication. The workshops were structured around the following topics:

#### Reading between the lines

What do funders look for? While there are standards for all grant applications, most often funding organisations frame the application form in terms that explain exactly what they are looking for. In this workshop, international and local systems of funding are compared, looking at how they work; their benefits and shortcomings; return on investment; issues of access; strategies for application, and more. The UJ Faculty Research Committee and University Research Committee project funding application forms are analysed in order to determine how to best formulate new proposals for submission to these university bodies, work-shopping a few outlines based on the needs of participants. Finally, a small number of external, local and international funding possibilities are discussed, and a proposal-in-progress is critiqued.

### Writing for academia

This workshop begins with a discussion about strategies for publication in art and design, moving from how initial ideation can be realised in conference papers and journal articles. Possible structuring of papers; methods of argumentation; developing thematic links within the paper; use and citing of sources; editing one's work; responses to peer-review; and finally submission of text for publication are covered. Various best practices for progression from each phase to the next are discussed and different types of publications and publishers, and their relation to time invested by the researcher and DoHET subsidy returns are considered. Thesis statements and abstracts, and how they relate to full articles, with reference to two recent publications are referred to. Extra time is spent brainstorming thesis statements and abstracts provided by participants towards their own upcoming conference papers or journal articles.

#### **New writing forms**

What is practice-based and practice-led research, and how can these approaches be used to model new forms of writing, publication, study, evaluation and subsidy criteria in art and design? This workshop begins with an in-depth discussion of arts and design research practices as they can and do lead to various forms of non-traditional publication, such as autoethnography (as ethnographic, art educational, art and design, or action research), narrative inquiry, or artists/designer's statements for both individual works and overall practices. Prior to this workshop, a reading that is a narrative inquiry about both narrative inquiry and Dr Stern's own work that has been accepted for publication will be distributed. This is used as a basis from which to discuss the differences and similarities

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between academic papers on the one hand, and inquiries into art and design practice on the other. The workshop closes with a discussion about writing as a part of practice-based and practice-led research – rather than an afterthought – and individual discussions for potential writing and publications with participants.

The workshops were exceptionally well received, with attendees commenting particularly on the value and relevance of the information and strategies provided. Below are some general comments from the anonymous forms:

"Excellent presenting – articulate, engaged & informative. Feel refreshed and enthused"; "It was confidence-building for me to share my ideas with colleagues, as I usually find this intimidating"; "Well done! Very catalytic. Our Faculty needs more of this. Good initiative Leora and great dynamic workshops Nathaniel"; "I enjoyed the speaker's openness, inter-modality and approachability. This is refreshing"; "In 26 years in the Faculty, this was the first opportunity to engage with colleagues across Depts. in terms of research"; "Extremely beneficial experience"; "Sharp, inclusive, interactive, accessible"; "This has been one of the most helpful, positive and current workshops I have ever attended on writing"; "This was most beneficial to me; it helped me to view my teaching, projects and personal interests as a potential new source of research".

Comments on what participants found most valuable:

"Interacting with colleagues ... confirming methodologies"; "Put me in a better position to advise my students. Also an opportunity to better articulate my own research"; "Its timing in the year. Helped me focus on my own goals for the year"; "Informative & unexpectedly lively! Helped me rethink my current writing projects, affirm some things & suggest new areas"; "Got an understanding of key aspects to include in fund-raising proposals. Learned how to make proposals more responsive to mission of the funders"; Strategic approach to writing proposals – how to play the game!"; "Just being able to discuss ideas!"; "The value of practice-led research as a highly legitimate form of research"; "Finding useful insight to managing practice through specific projects. Sharing and hearing examples of projects and funding proposals".

Outcomes: by the end of day two, more than 20 of the attendees had drafts of abstracts for conference papers and nearly every attendee on the last day – close to 50 – had the foundations of a dialogical text that could lead to an alternative publication on their various art- and design-based research projects.

- Dr Stern also consulted FADA staff on a range of topics, including PhD research and dissertations; programmatic changes to the Multimedia Dept.'s undergraduate course and Fashion Design's postgraduate curricula; faculty development with Departmental Heads; new courses and programmes in Industrial Design; new research projects, and their potential grants and outcomes; and new technologies being used in the classroom and as recruitment tools.
- Two follow up workshops facilitated by Dr Stern were held in June 2013. These were attended by Visual Arts and Multimedia staff respectively.
- Designing Research 1: workshop on approaches to writing articles/papers specifically for visual artists and designers, presented by Ann-Marie Tully, 25 February. Tully's presentation focused on image analysis techniques for practice-led writing approaches and argumentation. 6 FADA staff members attended.
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VIAD Reading Group, facilitated by Leora Farber and James Sey. The group is comprised of 4 FADA staff members, 4 Research Associates, and one member external to FADA. One person is elected as discussion leader per session; the reading is chosen by the lead reader, in correlation with their current research interests. The group meets once a month; 8 meetings took place over the year. The success of the group is dependent on relevant readings selected; if the lead leader is well prepared and whether stimulating discussion and debate is generated.

Staff mentorship on conference paper/article writing. Guidance is provided on conceptualising an argument, structuring the paper, writing style and techniques, arguing of premise, engagement with theoretical texts, and editing. This entails reading through drafts provided by staff and providing feedback via e-mail or in individual meetings.

Consultation with staff on research projects. Guidance is provided on project conceptualisation, proposal writing, identifying funding sources, and drawing up a budget, project planning and execution. VIAD staff held 5 meetings held with Judy Peters, giving input into conceptualisation of her project, proposal writing, project planning, and drawing up the budget, as well as detailed discussion on thematic and curatorial strategies for the accompanying exhibition. Consultations have also taken place with the staff of the Multimedia and Architecture Depts.; with students and staff from the Depts. of Industrial, Fashion and Jewellery Design, and with staff from the FADA Gallery. VIAD team members are frequently consulted around conceptual frameworks for exhibitions, conferences, exchange projects and research papers; and asked to offer support in the preparation and delivery of conference papers and articles.

While continuing with the above-mentioned tasks, VIAD took on the following new research capacity building initiatives in 2013:

Hosting workshops in areas of specific interest to the Faculty, such as those by Dr Nathaniel Stern on PLR approaches to writing; and by Prof Thad Metz on writing for accredited journals. The VIAD team is in the process of finalising details for a PLR writing roundtable that will include international and South Africa speakers, scheduled to take place at end-January 2014.

Facilitating the Research Faculty Working Group. The sessions provide students and staff with the opportunity to present conference papers or articles they are working on to the group for feedback. 5 Research Faculty Working Group sessions took place from July onwards. Prior to commencement of the sessions, meetings with each department were held to explain this initiative to their staff.

Initiatives undertaken to establish better lines of communication between VIAD and Departments, with a view to long-term relationship building:

Newly appointed VIAD Research and Projects Director, Tracy Murinik, held in-depth consultations with all FADA HoDs, with a view to gaining insight into historical perceptions of VIAD by HoDs; assess HoDs' expectations in light of the VIAD mandate for the past 6 years; identify ways in which strategic points of connection between Depts. and VIAD may be established.

Formal feedback on consultations with HoDs. T Murinik conducted a two hour workshop with all FADA HoDs, during which she reported on her findings in the individual consultations. Common historical and current perceptions of VIAD's role and position in the Faculty were identified and addressed; new strategic plans presented and discussed; possible points of connection identified. The workshop set a precedent for further conversations between VIAD and HoDs to take place.

VIAD Reading Group, facilitated by Leora Farber and James Sey. The group is comprised of 4 FADA staff members, 4 Research Associates, and one member external to FADA. One person is elected as discussion leader per session; the reading is chosen by the lead reader, in correlation with their current research interests. The group meets once a month; 8 meetings took place over the year. The success of the group is dependent on relevant readings selected; if the lead leader is well prepared and whether stimulating discussion and debate is generated.

Staff mentorship on conference paper/article writing. 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Requesting information on research being conducted by staff and MTech students. This information is being gathered so that VIAD staff can be better informed about what staff and post-grad student research is being conducted in FADA. T Murinik engaged with Multi-media staff in a group discussion on their current research.

Fashion design students workshop and performance. Workshop and performance successfully conducted. Workshop with Fashion Design students facilitated by visiting German designer, Regine Steenbock, conducted a three-day workshop with Fashion Design students. 21 outfits were created in the three-days. The students wore the outfits during a public site-specific performance choreographed by R Steenbock, assisted by T Murinik, titled White Fence. The performance took place on the Bunting Road Campus.

VIAD staff members or representatives participating in Departmental teaching events and assessments. T Murinik participated on the Architecture 4th year jury.

One VIAD staff member or representative to attend FADA gallery openings. This is with a view to establishing an active VIAD presence at FADA gallery events, and to show support.

#### **VIAD ANNUAL REVIEW**

A panel convened and chaired by Prof Federico Freschi (Executive Dean: FADA) met on 11 April 2013 to review the VIAD Research Centre. The panel consisted of an esteemed group of colleagues, both external and internal to the University: **Prof Amanda du Preez**, Associate Professor in the Department of Visual Arts at the University of Pretoria; **Prof Allan John Munro**, Research and Innovation Professor in the Department of Drama and Film at the Tshwane University of Technology; **Prof Anitra Nettleton**, Chair of the Centre for the Creative Arts of Africa at the University of the Witwatersrand; **Prof Bhekizizwe Peterson**, Professor and Head of African Literature at the University of the Witwatersrand; **Dr Deirdre Pretorius**, Head of Department: Graphic Design at FADA; **Dr Finzi Saidi**, Vice-Dean, FADA; **Prof Brenda Schmahmann**, Professor with a Research Focus at FADA; and **Prof Jane Taylor**, Wole Soyinke Chair of Drama at Leeds University. **Dr Christopher Masuku**, Executive Director, Research, University of Johannesburg was also present.

The panel was tasked to assess the report and documents presented by Dr Leora Farber, in order to review the Centre's activities over the period 2010-2012 in terms of the following: (a) the extent to which the Centre functioned productively and within the aims and scope of its charter; (b) to gauge the extent to which the recommendations of the 2010 review had been met; and (c) to determine whether the Centre should continue to receive financial support from the URC. The following documents were revised and submitted for the review:

- VIAD Charter
- VIAD MoA with Research Associates
- VIAD Theoretical Framework
- VIAD Review document, containing:
- 3 year budgets (2010-2013)
- Strategic goals and performance indicators for 2014-2016
- Projected budgets for 2014-2016
- Motivation for further URC funding for the RC

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- VIAD outputs, activities and achievements from 2010-2013
- Provisional RC activities for 2013-2016
- URC Review Template.

Outcomes of the review can be gauged from the below extract, taken from the Dean's report on the review that he presented at the URC meeting of 7 May:

The review panel was unanimous in commending the Research Centre for the work that it has done over the past five years in promoting high-level debate in terms of its thematics, and for forging new ground in the area of Practice-led research in South African visual arts. It noted that the Centre has, through prolific scholarly publication and the hosting of international conferences, curated exhibitions and the like, achieved a significant national profile. In the final analysis, five of the eight reviewers selected the first option to describe their overall impression of the Centre, viz. 'Outstanding and should continue to be supported'. The remaining three reviewers did not mark this section, but the context of their reports suggests that they strongly support the Centre and its application for continued funding.

The reviewers made a number of recommendations as to how the Centre could further consolidate and strengthen its position. They fall into five broad categories: (i) increased footprint, (ii) transformation, (iii) publication, (iv) capacity building, and (v) funding. Was of responding to each of these recommendations have been addressed in the revised VIAD Vision and Strategy document 2014-2016. URC funding was approved for another 3 year cycle.

#### **STRATEGIC PLANNING 2014-2016**

In the second half of 2013, Tracy Murinik was appointed as Research and Projects Director and Reshma Chhiba as Project Manager in the Centre. Prof Brenda Schmahmann, who joined FADA earlier in 2013 as Professor with Research Specialisation, is now a second full-time staff member in VIAD. The Centre actively recruits PDRFS, ideally looking at registering between three and four per annum. Dr Daniela Groeller is currently registered as a PDRF in VIAD for the period October 2013-Ocotber 2014.

The VIAD team (comprising Dr L Farber, Ms T Murinik, Ms R Chhiba and Prof B Schmahmann) has worked intensively throughout the fourth quarter of 2013 in mapping the Centre's future direction/s at all levels and conceptualising VIAD's strategic plan for the upcoming three-years (2014-2016). This process has involved:

- assessing and evaluating VIAD's position (in the larger intellectual discursive sphere, in a South African, African and international context, as well as in relation to FADA and UJ) to date;
- · reflecting on what has been achieved; considering how to consolidate and build upon work done; and critically reassessing how VIAD's fundamental aims, objectives, vision and mission can be refocused in alignment with its strategic plan for 2014-2016. This has been done in consultation with and consideration of numerous interested parties, including the FADA Dean, members of VIAD's Advisory Board and FADA Heads of Departments (HoDs), and with recognition of the recommendations made by the reviewers that participated in the URC Research Centre Review conducted in April 2013.
- · clarification of VIAD's relevance as a research generating facility in the larger intellectual discursive sphere, in a South African and international context, as well as in relation to FADA and UJ;
- strategising around ways of not only maintaining but raising VAID's academic standards and the quality of its outputs, while meeting target numbers;
- · strategising around ways of increasing VIAD's public profile at national and international levels;
- strategising around the Centre's operational and financial sustainability.

- VIAD outputs, activities and achievements from 2010-2013
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#### Outcomes of the internal review/strategising process:

- Revision of VIAD Charter, Vision and Strategy document, Conceptual framework document, MoA with Research Associates.
- Revisiting VIAD's strategic aims and objectives; realigning research focus areas towards more
- Identifying/deciding on/shaping projects and initiatives that will further VIAD's strategic, institutional and financial aims. Planning 3 schedule in accordance with these aims.
- Conceptualising events, projects, textual and creative outputs in relation to VIAD's strategic goals, RAs', PDRF's research and FADA requirements.
- Developing third arm of income generation plan consultancy to corporates, industry, art and design bodies.
- Relooking at the existing group of RAs; identification of those that are no longer working within the RC's conceptual parameters/not
  involved in the Centre and/or not producing textual outputs on a regular basis or whose research ethics sit uncomfortable with VIAD's
  ethical stance. These contracts will not be renewed for 2014.
- Identification of high-profile, prolific researchers working within VIAD thematics; extending invitations to selected individuals to join VIAD as RAs. Researchers working across a range of art and design disciplines, or from interdisciplinary were selected, as well as diversity.
- Consolidation of roles within VIAD: Brenda Schmahmann's position and role within VIAD negotiated and clearly defined.

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## **5.4 REPORT: FADA GALLERY**

The FADA gallery operates as an intrinsic part of the broader academic programme in the Faculty and, to this end, has focused its activities on two strategies; first, the organisational structure and corporate governance matters were reviewed in line with UJ policies. Second, the annual exhibition programme was confirmed, with a strategic focus on exhibitions that promoted the various creative disciplines in the Faculty as well as shows by external stakeholders and student assessment and departmental showcase exhibitions. The year under review reflected a successful continuation of the programme, the details of which are as follows:

#### **OPERATIONAL**

The public visibility of the FADA gallery has been growing steadily since 2006, and it is well positioned to support the needs of the academic programmes and to build the profile of the Faculty. Under the energetic stewardship of part-time Curator, Mariapaola McGurk, the Gallery produced a number of interesting and well-attended exhibitions during 2013. Ms McGurk was also active in promoting the gallery on various social media platforms (including having live Twitter feeds at most exhibition openings) as well as on radio and in print media.

The Gallery and its exhibitions also served as an important point for networking opportunities, and the Dean hosted a number of events for industry stakeholders at the Gallery during the course of the year. The second lecture in the 'Values' series, by Prof Edgar Pieterse on the theme of 'Regeneration' was held in the Gallery. This served both to bring a wider audience to the Gallery, and to establish it as an emerging centre of thought leadership as regards the creative industries.

The Gallery is clearly an important strategic asset to the Faculty and the University, and at the behest of the Dean, a new strategic plan is being developed, which will see it increasingly supporting the drive towards global excellence and stature in terms of its exhibition and public engagement programmes.

## **EXHIBITION PROGRAMME**

During the year under review, the gallery hosted a number of exhibitions on a variety of themes including photography, human rights, community engagement, alumni achievement and student shows. These are detailed in the Marketing Report.

## 5.5 REPORT: DESIGN FOR SOCIAL DEVELOPMENT

In the face of staggering inequality and rapid change in South Africa, Design Society Development (DSD) (previously Design for Social Development) represents a Community of Practice (CoP) in the Faculty of Art, Design and Architecture. In 2013 we met biweekly to interrogate research, projects, methods and products that impact on the intersection and interplay between design, society and development in the specific context of Greater Johannesburg, South Africa. *Design* refers to the conscious choices we make in creating systems (community, society & productive systems) and technologies (products, artefacts, communicative technologies, systems integration); *society* the human context that includes the broader social systems of culture, economy, politics and environment; and *development* the discourse and practice of positive and considered change. We draw on critical political economy, social sciences, appropriate technology development, participatory and human centred design, and other design approaches in our practice and research. Our members include students, academics and professionals from the disciplines of Industrial Design, Multimedia, Development Studies, Architecture, Fashion Design, Graphic Design, Visual Art, Interior Design and Economics. Each year DSD hosts a public seminar at FADA in order to strengthen opportunities of transdisciplinary collaboration and networking.

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
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
On the 16 September 2013 DSD hosted our 2nd public seminar, Achieving the Good Life: Design as an Instrument of a Caring City. The seminar was held at the FADA Auditorium, University of Johannesburg, Bunting Road Campus from 18:30 – 19:00. The two speakers were <a href="Erky Wood">Erky Wood</a>, who is a specialist in urban development processes, in the identification of strategic objectives, parametric urban cost modelling and local authority issues and their effect on the urban design process. The second speaker was <a href="Dr Tom Sanya">Dr Tom Sanya</a>, who is a senior lecturer in sustainable theory and design at the University of Cape Town's School of Architecture. His main research area is Sustainable Habitat Innovations (SusHI). Using a transdisciplinary approach, he teamworks with different academics, practitioners, government actors, civil society, small and medium scale enterprises and members of the general public in the search for and reflection upon (innovative) solutions for long term building and habitat sustainability. The two talks were moderated by Dr. Naudé Malan, Senior Lecturer, Department of Anthropology and Development Studies, Faculty of Humanities, UJ, and was well attended by members of the public, professionals, academics and students.

In 2014 DSD aims to spread its wings and be recognised internationally as the Johanensburg lab for the Design for Social Innovation and Sustainability (DESIS) Network (a sub-association Cumulus, the International Association of Universities and Colleges of Art, Design and Media). 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# Community Service and Stakeholder Engagement

The Faculty continued its commitment to community service during 2013. This was demonstrated in its ongoing projects in the wider community, service to academic and professional communities, leadership roles in professional and industry associations and other general service activities such as participation in various public bodies. In 2013, the Faculty continued to participate in Mandela Day, organised by the UJ Community Office, involvement in HIV/AIDS initiatives managed by the UJ Institutional Office for HIV/AIDS (IOHA).

A number of memoranda of agreement were signed and initiated during the year. Twenty-one international researchers and academics were hosted by the Faculty, from institutions in the United States, the Netherlands, Uganda, Belgium, Scotland, Israel, Sweden and France. National collaboration and interaction took place through a continued programme of industry lectures, seminars and talks given by prominent designers, artists, industry leaders and academics from a variety of institutions in South Africa.



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# 6.1 Community Projects

Community service and good citizenship are integral to the Faculty's teaching programmes. Students in all departments in the Faculty were required to participate in at least one community project during the year.

These included 14 Community Research projects (CR), 10 Organised Outreach (OO) projects, 12 Service Learning (SL) projects and 7 projects that were a combination of SL and CR or OO. Departmental projects are outlined in the tables that follow.

Departments are integrating community learning into their teaching programmes with students being placed in communities and engaging directly with issues of relevance. It is intended that the projects progressively assume a multidisciplinary character, in keeping with one of the Faculty's strategic objectives which is to leverage its multidisciplinary composition in response to the nature of contemporary problems.

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



#### Note 1: Remuneration

The Faculty's total remuneration budget spent is 98.38%. The Faculty's temporary salary budget spent is 88.96% (excludes provision for sabbatical and post upgrades). The provision for sabbatical and post upgrades totals to R542 703 of which R67 337 was used. The Faculty's tutor budget spent is 57.96%. The Faculty used R911 173 for temporary appointments against Research Funds and Trust Funds. The Faculty

used R3 750 for tutor appointments against Trust Funds.

Note 2: Operating Expense (includes Capital Expenses > and < R15 000) The Faculty's Operating Expense is 97.49% spent. This excludes the total encumbrance of R712 867. The Faculty spent R4 450 205 against Research Funds and Trust Funds.

#### **HEALTH AND SAFETY**

#### Architecture

No safety incidents reported.

Air conditioning remains a major concern in the Department. The third year studios are the most problematic.

Staff offices are very poorly ventilated and require attention

#### Fashion

Workshop Problems Identified

Heavy rain and water in the industrial sewing laboratory:

After heavy rain water leaks into the department through cracks in the building structure and leave pools of water on one of the industrial sewing laboratory's floor. If the rains are particularly heavy, or happen during week-ends or at night and the cleaning staff are not able to clean up the area immediately, water filters underneath the classroom walls and affects the industrial sewing laboratory next to it. Due to possible electrocution - students are not permitted in the venues until the cleaning staff has dried the affected area. The cleaning staff is however at risk. Lost work-time is, however, not always recovered due to venue occupancy.

Email notification of the condition is immediately sent to the appropriate Health and safety committees and Maintenance.

Heavy rain and the Pattern construction studio:

The same problem mentioned above affects the floor of one of the pattern construction studios. Due to the possibility of slipping on wet floors - students are not permitted in the venues until the cleaning staff has dried the affected area. Lost work-time is, however, not always recovered due to venue occupancy.

Email notification of the condition is immediately sent to the

appropriate Health and safety committees and Maintenance.

Safety incidents

Cut or needle prick on fingers: 10 such incidents reported during the year. Mrs Dolly Pitso is the Health and Safety Officer and can treat these immediately or refer the student to the clinic for further assessment.

Severe cramp in hand: Health and Safety Officer massaged the student's hand.

Student experiencing chest pains: The student was referred to the clinic who referred her to hospital for further testing.

Cut with scissors: Student was referred to the clinic by the Health and Safety Officer who treated the cut and gave the student a tetanus injection.

Working environment

The HoD and Workshop Technician are both members of the Faculty Health and Safety Committee and as such report on incidences in the department workshop to the committee. Action plans are put in place to deal with any potential risks identified.

All incoming students are trained to use the department's workshop equipment and are required sign off on the machinery they have received training on. The Workshop

Technician is available to assist students with all equipment, to ensure students use the equipment safely and to advise students on the best prototyping strategies.

The Campus Health and Safety Officer conducts 4 audits of the workshop spaces of the Department of Industrial Design each year.

## Interior Design

Working environment

The following aspects have been mentioned in previous years and continued to impact on the work environment in 2013:

Ventilation problems (heating and cooling). The staff office area remains to be very warm in the summer months. Improvements were expected in 2013.

Heating and cooling equipment in the Interior Design computer lab present continuous problems

Ventilation in the Department's model making area requires attention

The noise factors in the staff office area remain to be problematic. Staff members share offices that are not screened of and impacts on conducting tasks that requires concentration and reflection.

#### Multimedia

Incidents

Water leaks during thunderstorms in three of the computer labs have been reported. Phase one HVAC installation points were not sufficiently sealed. Maintenance requests were processed.

Working environment

Health and safety issues in the Multimedia department are minimal. HVAC issues have been resolved, the temperatures in all labs are set at a constant 23 degrees, with added fresh leaks in Studios 151 and 152

air units contributing to a healthy working environment. The automated temperature settings are unreliable and will be more stable when a building management system is commissioned. Mr Ambala has attended first aid and fire fighting training in 2013.

#### Visual Art Working environment

The lack of adequate ventilation in the 3rd year studios, sculpture and BTech studios is debilitating and counterproductive to effective teaching and learning. It is hoped that the urgent implementation of the HVAC 3rd phase will resolve the problem.

#### Academic Administration Working environment

Physical safety of staff members in administration office remains problematic during peak periods

# STUDIOS, LABORATORIES AND EQUIPMENT

Given the steady increase in enrolments over the past five years, the Faculty is close to capacity in terms of its available resources and equipment. Indeed, in some programmes – particularly in Fashion, Graphic Design, Interior Design and Architecture – it will be difficult to increase intake without having to duplicate classes, which will have considerable workload and staffing resource implications. For the most part, the Faculty has appropriate and well-maintained equipment to support its teaching, and students all have access to computers and the Internet via the Departmental computer laboratories. The University's planned roll-out of handheld devices to all students over the next few years will place some burden on the available bandwidth, as well as the capacity of wireless networks, and this will have to be carefully monitored. The biggest concern regarding infrastructure remains the question of ventilation. The second phase of the HVAC project was rolled out in 2013, which has brought some relief to teaching areas, but staff offices remain poor ventilated and insulated. The availability of office space is also a growing problem as the staff complement increases, and the Faculty will require the University's support in reconfiguring space in the building to provide for more offices. The lack of office space also creates an impediment to the strategic need to increase the number of postdoctoral fellows (PDRFs) in the Research Centre, as the Faculty is unable consistently to provide suitable office accommodation for Fellows (this proved a particular frustration for the PDRF in the Research Centre in 2013).

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# SOCIAL AND ENVIRONMENTAL RESPONSIBILITY

#### Architecture

The Department participates in social and environmental responsibility at two levels:

Firstly the Department has installed recycling bins in the department's studios that encourage students and staff to sort the waste at source. The bins are very clearly labelled and are well used.

Secondly the Department's involvement in social responsibility can be seen in the building of the Slovo Park Playground Project in an area that is socially deprived in many ways. The second year diploma in architecture

students and their lecturers built a children's play park in the informal settlement of Slovo Park in the south western part of Johannesburg. This was a two week construction programme during which they sourced materials from donors like PPC the Cement Company and used recycled old tyres to create a robust but intriguing play park for the children of Slovo Park.

#### Fashion

The department encourages social and environmental responsibility through:

## Graphic Design

During 2013 the department was involved in a number of student projects across all years to promote social responsibility. First Years participated in two competition that required students to research social issues; firstly they designed a poster with the theme Right to housing organised by This is Tomorrow and secondly they designed an image entitled Embracing our differences: enriching lives through diversity. Second year students' designed marketing solutions for UJ's IOHA, helping spread information about HIV and aids, as well as IOHA's services. A billboard promoting HIV/AIDS awareness designed by a student was implemented on Empire Road.

Third year students participated in Green Week, with a focus on 'human factories', coming up with simple strategies of creating products from recyclables.

Third Year diploma students did research on and did designs for the SA Organ Donation foundation. BTech students collaborated with the Melville community to find design solutions for community problems BTech students also produced crowdsourcing websites looking at various societal

issues such as funding and supporting wildlife conservation and rebuilding Johannesburg CBD architecture through crowdsourcing. BTech students participated in the Design Indaba 'Your Street' Competition and 16 design projects were implemented within the students own neighbourhoods with the aim of addressing a problem or need within the community. Ms C van Zyl was involved with the Design Society Development research group.

In 2013 the department continued with attempts at environmental sustainability by having paperless meetings, copying all student hand-outs double-sided and reducing the page sizes were practical, using recycle bins in studios, providing learning material to students in electronic format and requiring assessments in electronic format where practical, and using the library site to upload readings. Paper recycling is used in the staff areas, and departmental computers are set to sleep after three minutes.

# Industrial Design

The department has three core ethos that are written into the programme guides:

(a) As professionals the students will one day be responsible for the manufacture of products that will be produced in great numbers. The students have the responsibility to consider the environmental impact of their creativity.

(b) As professionals the students are likely to design most of their products for just 10% of the world's population who can afford designed consumer goods. However, the students also have a responsibility to design products for the other 90% who may not be able to afford the luxury of the minority but nevertheless need access to well-designed solutions in their everyday life.

(c) At the centre of what the student is responsible for developing is the person or people who will one day use the results of their creativity, the product end user. Every aspect of the students design process needs to consider this individual or these groups as a priority.

During each year of study these three principles form the foundation of the projects the students are asked to complete. By including such emphasis as the basis of the project work within the department there is an expectation that this will have a positive effect on the students after they graduate and work as professionals.

In 2013 the following projects furthered these aims:

FADA Green Week 2013 – 3rd Year students from all departments in the Faculty worked on sustainable design solutions for problems they had identified through research.

Tshulu Stove Project – Chris Bradnum field tested 30 X improved wood burning stoves in the HaMakuya area in Limpopo. At the end of the

field trial, a series of design and cocreation workshops were conducted with the test group. A further 50 X improved wood burning stoves were handed to community members to field test. The stoves were laboratory tested by the SeTAR Centre and proved to be remarkably efficient. The project aims to: improve indoor air quality in rural household kitchens, reduce the drudgery of collecting wood, improve the ergonomics of cooking from that of a three stone fire, reduce deforestation, and include end users as decision makers in design for development projects.

HaMakuya Hydroponics Project Martin Bolton designed and field
tested a rural hydroponics kit in the
HaMakuya area in Limpopo. The
project aims to: reduce water wastage
through evaporation when growing
vegetables, improve harvest potential
of home grown vegetables, and make
cost effective hydroponic systems
available to rural households.

Ivory Park Retained Heat Cooker Project – Justine Hunkin completed her MTech research on the retained heat cooker in the Ivory Park area. Her prototypes were exhibited as a portion of the department's student exhibition at the end of the year.

Kyle Brand, under the supervision of Angus Campbell, completed the design and testing work for the Small Scale Farming Kit in Soweto. The results and products from his MTech research were exhibited at the student exhibition at the end of the year.

In 2014 the department will continue selecting projects that focus on these core priorities.

#### Interior Design

In the National Diploma lecturers engaged with a number of projects in 2013 that promoted social responsibility and environmental sustainability among students and also staff. These were;

Collaborative project as part of second year Interior Design and first year Industrial Design's respective curriculums. Interior Design students designed a children's chair, the Industrial Design students manufactured it. Chairs were donated to Orphanage in 2014.

The second year students were required to research available building materials and finishes that have the lowest environmental impact in the module Materials and Finishes 2. These materials needed to be analysed according to one of the acceptable environmental assessment tools.

The third year students conducted a survey of three recycle stations on the APB campus for Occupational Safety. This improved their understanding of waste management on the Campus. The results and outcome of the project was presented to Anzani Rautenbach.

All third year students took part in Green Design Week.

In third year the South African Constitution and social rights of people were debated in the module, Professional Practice 3.

Third year student took part in the Aids awareness campaign which was done with the UJ Institutional Office for HIV and Aids (IOHA). The student conceptualised an exhibition that could be communicated to the public using images and text. The final designs were displayed in the atrium during Diversity Week.

In the BTech programme all students were required to address and reconcile environmental, social and economic issues that were appropriate to their chosen study topics. The following projects addressed socially relevant aspects;

This project was one of three projects in the institution that were chosen to be presented at the U21 Conference that took place in July 2013. The student attended the conference and delivered a verbal presentation at the conference.

Embracing a healthier learning and teaching environment by adaptively re-using a heritage building in Johannesburg's city field trial, a series of design and cocreation workshops were conducted with the test group. A further 50 X improved wood burning stoves were

#### Visual Art

The Department's research focus on art for social change and development places it as a forerunner in the Faculty in terms of the UJ strategic thrust related to social relevance and social responsibility. Prof. Berman's role in this regard is invaluable.

The undergraduate programme has a curriculated focus on art & citizenship especially at 1st and 2nd year levels. Students have opportunities to develop this focus in their work at 3rd, 4th and masters' levels.

On a more practical level, the student's involvement in the Green Design week programme and the curriculum-integration IOHA HIV/ AIDS poster design awareness campaign, are indicators of social responsibility amongst the students.

Other initiatives include the 4th year work-integrated learning programme that involves the students' visit to the rural community of HaMakuya in Limpopo, as well as the students' involvement in the Mandela Day programme at the Helen Joseph Hospital and the 3rd year students' involvement in the Germiston hospital mural painting project.

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
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
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
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












# **Conclusion** *and Way Forward*

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FADA has over the past few years established itself as a viable and respectable brand in the field of art and design education in South Africa.

As this report demonstrates, it is a highly functional and well-managed environment, with clearly-understood and articulated processes, policies and reporting hierarchies. It has a clear sense of purpose in terms of its role in the higher education landscape, and is committed to fostering excellence in preparing its graduates for the highly competitive world of the creative professions. Departments are well-managed, and are united by their palpable commitment to teaching and learning across all programmes and



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modules. This is in turn supported by the Faculty's excellent facilities and equipment. Over the past five years FADA has also developed an increasing competence in various aspects of creative and academic research, not least in the area of practiceled research, led as an academic project by the Research Centre, Visual Identities in Art and Design. Thus, given its physical and institutional environment, expertise and ethos, FADA is poised to be a leading player in the national and regional context

as much through its excellent facilities and staff, collegial atmosphere and strong links with industry, as through the fact that it actively embraces the notion of art, design and architecture as active agents of social change.

Its considerable strengths notwithstanding, there are still a number of issues that need to be addressed going forward. The current nature of the PQM, and particularly the lack of a PhD programme, will inevitably curtail the Faculty's

ambitions in the short to medium term (given the required articulation parameters of the HEQSF, the Faculty is not likely to offer a PhD before 2019 at the earliest). Although lip service is paid to the notion of comprehensivity within the broader University context, there is substantial room for improvement in this regard – at the

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the potentially negative consequences on research output, remain a cause for concern. There is also a need to improve the racial diversity of the staff profile to be more reflective both of national demographics, as well as the Faculty's student body.

A Faculty-wide strategic breakaway, held in June 2013, focused on these and other issues in developing a way forward. To the question, 'what are we doing well?' the Faculty noted that one of its primary strengths comes from its core business: it is, after all, in the very nature of design to solve problems. As an Faculty of Art, Design and Architecture we are certainly focused on changing things

for the better, and take seriously our social responsibility and community engagement. The Faculty also has an outstanding record of producing highly employable students, and has excellent relationships with its industry partners. As a community of artists, designers and architects we recognise the wisdom of not changing for the sake of change, but actively support the inevitability of change. In response to the question, 'what could we be doing better?', the Faculty noted the need for an increasing emphasis on active partnering with regional, national and international universities, as well as the need for active membership of national and international professional bodies. The need to open up academic

research incentives – currently seen to be constrained by the Department of Higher Education and Training's accreditation systems - with consistent reward for innovative work creative work was flagged as an area for development. The Faculty could also benefit from an improved and more responsive marketing plan, particularly focused on achieving better visibility of its strengths; in other words, to advertise, promote, market, and capitalise on staff, student, and alumni successes in order to increase the visibility and credibility of the FADA brand. It was also noted that the potential of the FADA gallery could also be harnessed in more actively promoting the Faculty's identity.

From this discussion, a strategy emerged under the campaign heading 'Design Your Dream'. The first step towards realising the ambitions of this strategy is the need to define clearly the Faculty's mission, values and vision in relation to those of the University. In order to be successful, the strategy has to be consensual and value-driven. In this regard, the Faculty actively embraces the four core values of the University, since they are fundamental to what we do: **Imagination** is the lifeblood of the creative disciplines; **Conversation**, or a commitment to active dialogue with the world, is essential in any creative endeavour; **Regeneration** is in the very nature of creative and design thinking, which never accepts received wisdom and always anticipates the next horizon; while an **Ethical Foundation** is the cornerstone of any meaningful creative practice, which recognises the importance of defending the fragility of the consensus that enables freedom of expression.

The strategy going forward will be underscored by the following principles: first, embracing transformation as an active value, and second, applying one of the Faculty's core conceptual strengths, design and creative thinking. The focus in the short to medium term (i.e. to 2016) will be on five key areas, in keeping the University's strategic objectives to 2020, and all underscored by Strategic Objective Six: 'Fitness for Global Excellence and Stature':

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Development of a competitive PQM and programme delivery (related to the UJ Strategic Objective Two: Excellence in Teaching and Learning)

While cognisant of national and University imperatives, the PQM will be designed and continually adapted to ensure that the Faculty's programmes and qualifications are appealing as the first choice for prospective students. There will be an emphasis on consolidating programmes in pursuit of degree qualifications, but without losing sight of the considerable strengths from the old TWR technological heritage. The need to have a PhD programme in place is imperative if the Faculty is to achieve its ambitions of being leading centre of excellence in art and design education nationally, and to attract postgraduate students from elsewhere. The potential for various programmes, particularly in Architecture and Industrial Design, to be developed as flagship programmes is an important aspect of the conceptual core of the PQM, as is the potential to build cross-Faculty, interdisciplinary programmes. The increasing use of technology in the classroom, and a shift towards a learning- rather than a teaching-centred approach and undergraduate levels will also enjoy priority going forward.



The need to expand both our external and internal marketing initiatives is crucial to the Faculty's success going forward. We will continue to leverage the potential brand development value in our ongoing exhibitions, conferences and events, as well as through continuing to build relationships and partnerships with significant external brands, for example the Design Indaba, the Johannesburg Art Fair, the Goodman Gallery, and Cumulus. The FADA Gallery has an important be given priority in filling vacant posts. The recruitment of role to play in this regard, and has the potential to become the 'face' of practice-led research in art and design nationally, with a clear link between the activities of the Faculty and the Research Centre. The development of an annual 'Design Your Dream' festival is a project that could hold significant potential for promoting the Faculty and the University. We will continue to invite high-level visiting visitors – both as academics and practitioners – in order to establish ourselves as a place where important opinions are shaped and disseminated.

Transformation (Related to UI **Strategic Objective Four: An Enriching and Student-Friendly Learning and Living Experience**)

Transformation needs to be understood as an active value, something that informs everything that we do as a community of artists, designers and architects. It is important also to align our purpose with national priorities, in ensuring that our students emerge as productive and engaged, socially-responsible citizens. The active recruitment of black students, particularly from disadvantaged schools, will continue to be a priority. The recruitment of black and foreign staff is also an important aspect of the Faculty's focus on transformation, and as far as possible such candidates will international students, particularly from African countries, requires the development of a focused strategy, and will enjoy priority in the next few years. The creation of a 'fun' environment is also important in terms of supporting the student experience, with a focus on developing opportunities for students to come together in non-curricular, social contexts, while the use of technology to support teaching and learning will become increasingly sophisticated.



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Looking beyond 2016 to 2020, the strategy will be recalibrated to focus on ensuring global excellence. This strategy will be predicated on the assumption that the previous four years will have achieved (a) a greater degree of transformation, both in demographics, as well as in staff qualifications and academic culture; (b) consistently high research outputs; (c) full articulation from undergraduate to postgraduate (and especially an intake into the doctoral programme; and (d) viable and effective flagship and cross-Faculty, interdisciplinary programmes. While it is difficult to anticipate the exact nature of the operating context in six years' time, the strategic focus should then be able to shift to the following:

## Visibility

Nationally, regionally, and internationally FADA must be recognised as a place of excellence in terms of its PQM, the research that it produces, the environment in which it operates, and both the staff and student experience.

#### Research

FADA must be seen as a thought and opinion leader in terms of practice-led research in art and design, as much through its research outputs as its links with industry, advisory bodies, and international communities of practice. It should have a significant number of rated researchers, and be attracting increased external funding. Its graduates should be considered both highly-skilled practitioners as well as thought leaders for the knowledge economy.

## Programmes and Qualifications

By 2020 the Faculty must have a Doctoral programme in place serving both academic and professional disciplines. Given the considerable resident expertise in these fields, the Faculty should leverage its potential to develop Art and Design History and Theory as a centre of excellence, in collaboration with the Faculty of Humanities, while the proposed cross-Faculty, interdisciplinary programme

in Sustainable Megacities should be attracting doctoral students to the Faculty. The flagship programmes should be delivering on their potential to attract high-calibre students and researchers to the Faculty.

## High-level engagement with industry

The Faculty should be able to position itself as a leading player in enterprise development and commercialisation, in collaboration with partners such as the Resolution Circle and the proposed SABS Design Institute.

## International linkages and mobility

The Faculty Strong will focus increasingly on leveraging dynamic collaborations with leading institutions in the world, and will offer guaranteed mobility of staff and students. Credit-bearing, short learning programmes will be strategically positioned to appeal to international exchange students.

Over the past few years FADA's reputation and stature has grown significantly nationally, and with an increasing emphasis on developing international linkages, this is likely to expand globally. In short, the Faculty has tremendous potential to contribute substantially to the University's ambitions to realise global excellence and stature, while realising its own vision of being the Faculty that is leading the way in promoting creative and professional excellence in art, design and architecture in Johannesburg and beyond.

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# **Appendix 1: Departmental Reviews**

## **DEPARTMENT OF ARCHITECTURE**

The Department's performance in 2013 was guided by five strategic themes set by the University. The themes were:

- Institutional Culture
- Employment Equity
- Transformational Leadership, Governance and Management
- Academic Excellence
- A Student-Centred and Caring Institution

#### Transformational Leadership, Governance and Management

2013 saw a change of leadership in the Department with Dr Finzi Saidi taking over from Prof Christo Vosloo in September.

#### Academic Excellence - Validation of Architecture Programmes

The most outstanding achievement for the Department of Architecture in 2013 was the unconditional accreditation of all its three programmes by the South African Council for the Architectural Profession (SACAP). The accreditation visit took place from 14 to 16 May 2013. The panel included a representative from the Commonwealth Association of Architects (CAA), which gave the validation progress international credibility. The unconditional accreditation means that all graduates of the Department will be eligible to register as professionals in the various categories designated by SACAP. The accredited programmes are as follows:

National Diploma: Architectural Technology—Candidate Technologist Category

BTech: Architectural Technology (Applied Design)—Candidate Senior Technologist Category

MTech: Architectural Technology (Professional)—Candidate Architect Category

It must be noted that this was the first time that the Department of Architecture had presented the M Tech Professional programme for validation by SACAP following its introduction as a new programme offering in 2012. What this means is that UJ graduates in the M Tech (Prof) programme will be eligible to register in the highest category of the architectural profession, namely as a candidate architect. The status also ensures that the Department of Architecture is on par with other departments and schools of architecture in the country in terms of its programme offerings. The Department hopes that achievement of this status will attract more Master's students to its programme. It should be noted that the Department has so far produced at total of 23 Master's graduates since 2012. The next validation of the Department will be in 2017.

The successful accreditation was the result of a concerted, collective effort by all the academic staff in the Department, who showed great dedication and commitment to the process.

#### Advisory Board and Quality Systems

The Department set up an advisory board comprising prominent academics external to UJ and practicing architects to advise the Department on the preparation for the validation process by SACAP. An Advisory Board meeting was held on 13 March 2013 to examine all Departmental documents. The Department reviewed all documentation and programmes in response to comments and criticisms of the advisory board.

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Following receipt of the Validation Report, the Department prepared its Improvement Plan which was subsequently submitted to the APQC and approved by the Faculty Board.

#### A Student-Centred and Caring Institution: Teaching and Learning

The Department identified two first year diploma modules as at-risk modules, namely Construction and Detail 1 and Applied Building Science, both of which had very low pass rates.

The intervention for Construction and Detailing 1 was to increase the number of tutors to assist the lecturer in marking and giving feedback.

For the Applied Building Science (ABS) module, the Department employed a lecturer with specific building and environmental science knowledge to run the module. In addition two tutors were employed to assist the lecturer with the ABS 1 module. This has seen a marked improvement in the ABS 1 throughput rate.

#### New and Future Programmes Offering

The Department's new programmes – a Diploma in Architecture and Bachelor of Architecture were approved by the CHE and HEQC after a long wait. These new programmes are scheduled to be presented by the Department in 2014. The Bachelor's degree in architecture will provide a new avenue of architecture for students who have the required APS score for admission, while for those with lower APS score the opportunity to study for architecture will be available through the new diploma. This is in line with UJ's status as a comprehensive university that offers access to a wider section of society.

New curricula for the new diploma and degree were discussed and developed in preparation for implementation. A phasing-out plan for the old diploma programme was approved by both APQC and Faculty Board.

The Department has drafted a PhD proposal document which will be presented for approval in 2014.

#### Alıımn

The Department has been instrumental in the formation of its alumni organisation, the Architecture Students & Alumni Platform (ASAP). The aims are twofold: first, to promote academic excellence in all programmes offered in the Department; and second to promote professional development together with the Department by way of exhibitions and debates on architecture and urban design at FADA. As part of the alumni activities ASAP donated five book prizes to all programmes for top performing students in the Department in 2013.

#### **Employment Equity**

While the staff profile has remained static it must be noted that the challenge of attracting staff from designated groups still remains. The Department lost one senior female member of staff, Ms M Silverman, by resignation. The selection process for replacement staff is underway, and appointments will be made in 2014.

#### Community Engagement

The Department was involved in two Community Engagement projects:

'Best Life for Every Child', a FADA Landscaping Course collaboration with Johannesburg Child Welfare has built a collective systemic model of 48 elements that constitute 'What It Looks Like When It's Fixed' for Thembalethu Centre at the Old Drill Hall in Ward 123. The Best Life programme is a collaborative programme of a range of interventions with over 108 partner stakeholders. Its objective is to enable interventions that create a safe, clean and safe environment for children and for all, in the self-proclaimed precinct connecting the Old Drill Hall and St Mary's Cathedral. To this end the programme produced precinct plans, which will be placed before the Mayoral Committee in 2014. As a visioning exercise for that

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precinct plan, the UJ third year architecture landscaping students were invited to respond to the systemic structural and social challenges confronted in this space with a design vision for the precinct.

The students participated in the World Aids Day (1 December 2013) launch event at the precinct in partnership with the JMPD, the Department of Transport, the Mayor, Pikitup, loveLife, Sonke Gender Justice, the Taxi Council for Gauteng, Keleketla library and many others. The UJ third year students staged an exhibition, at the Drill Hall, of the design vision produced during their studio course in the space.

#### Slovo Park Playground Project

The second year Diploma in Architecture students and their lecturers built a children's play park in the informal settlement of Slovo Park in the South Western part of Johannesburg. This was a two week construction programme during which they sourced materials from donors like PPC and recycled old tyres to create a robust but intriguing play park for the children of Slovo Park.

#### Internationalisation / Collaboration

French/SA students exchange: Learning from Kliptown (South Africa) & Learning from Uzeste (France).

This involved a two-way ten day exchange project of Master's students and staff between 2012 and 2013.

The 2012 ten day international exchange project (multiple physical interventions with the community of SKY in Kliptown, Soweto) was concluded successfully with the return leg of UJ Department of Architecture masters students to Uzeste, France (29 April to 12 May 2013). The reciprocal exchange programme revolves around an inter-cultural, community-driven, design-build pedagogical underpinning. It has led to the further possibility of establishing an MOU between UJ's Department of Architecture and the School of Architecture, Toulouse Le-Mirail – discussions to this possible end are in process.

## DEPARTMENT OF FASHION

2013 was both a challenging and an exicting year. The Department introduced the new Diploma in Fashion Production, appointed a new staff member and promoted another, presented a discipline- specific colloquium, started a Winter School initiative to assist students and increase pass and throughput rates, and developed the BA Fashion Degree programme.

#### **Student Performance:**

Undergraduate:

The overall performance of students in the Department was satisfactory. The Department was able to provide a comprehensive tutor structure for first year students in both the theory and practical component of the two programme offerings. In addition to the tutor structure, the Winter School initiative proved to be a platform for first year students to re-affirm the base knowledge in pattern and garment construction. This successful initiative will be expanded on in 2013 to include theory. Student finances and the amount of students requiring financial assistance continues to grow. The Department was therefore grateful to the FP&M SETA for continued bursaries, to the value of R850 000, presented to students. An emphasis on integrating module content in both undergraduate programmes during 2012 proved very successful and was thus was expanded on in 2013 in the new Diploma offering and the BTech Fashion and BTech Clothing

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#### Postgraduate:

The Department continued to develop the Master's programme. One student, Sandhya Lalloo-Morar graduated cum laude at the graduation ceremony of 29 May, 2013. Seven Master's candidates are still in process of completion. One candidate submitted, staff member Ms C Lavelle, submitted her research report for examination in November 2013, bringing to a close the SQP Master's Programme in the department. Due to the number of students in process, no new students were admitted. Five potential Master's enrolments for 2014 were coached in the concept proposal programme the Department has introduced to assist new Master's applicants. Of the five, three have been accepted for enrolment into the MTech: Fashion programme in 2014.

#### Staff performance:

Staff development:

All staff is committed to constantly increasing their knowledge and upgrading of skills in teaching and learning and practice. Four staff members are currently engaging with further qualifications. One staff member submitted her Master's study for examination in November 2013, and the other three are currently engaged with Doctoral studies in Fashion Education, Historical Studies and Environmental Fashion Design. Staff has continually attended selected workshops such as teaching and learning, article writing and supervision.

#### Staff movements:

Dr Ramdass resigned in 2013 to take up a position at Unisa. The Department advertised for two senior lecturers and one lecturer to fill Dr Ramdass's post, as well as two other posts that had become available by the leaving of staff during 2012. The resourcing process will be concluded in 2014.

#### Research output:

Four conference papers were presented by two staff members at the PICMET and DEFSA conferences respectively. In addition, one article was published and four staff presented papers on fashion practice and process at the *JOZI Fashion Thread 1* Colloquium, held on 3 October, 2013. This event saw national and international participation in papers presented and guests attending.

# **DEPARTMENT OF GRAPHIC DESIGN**

#### STRATEGIES AND OBJECTIVES/TARGETS FOR 2013

#### Teaching and learning

The Department managed to achieve most of the objectives set for 2013. A great deal of time and effort was taken up in 2013 by the programme review and the preliminary report appeared very positive. The Department received numerous commendations and some recommendations. Due to the delay in receipt of the final peer review report it is not possible to comment at this point on the improvement plan as the Department is still working on it. Collaborations were successfully completed with the Food Technology and Strategic Communication Departments as well as the UI HIV/AIDS Centre. As can be seen from the

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performance overview, the pass rate for the modules taught in the Department are generally very good. All learning guides were upgraded and produced before classes started. The MA (Design) degree was externally approved. Internal feedback forms completed by students reflected high levels of satisfaction overall.

#### **Enrolment management**

Enrolment of suitably qualified students in the first year remains a challenging process. Despite conditionally admitting 68 students, the Department achieved a final enrolment of 49 first time entering students, three short of the targeted 52 students.. The reasons for this drop-off were due to students not meeting the entrance requirements, financial reasons, decisions to change their area of study, and being accepted by other institutions. The BTech target was exceeded by one students with 18 students gaining admission to the BTech programme. In an attempt to mitigate the risk around first time entering students, the Department instituted multiple and earlier submission dates for portfolios, instead of one final portfolio submission date in mid-November. Applicants could submit portfolios on a number of dates. Portfolios were assessed promptly and feedback provided to students.

#### Research, creative production and personal development

One accredited journal article was published and four conference papers were delivered, from which two were published in accredited conference proceedings. As this report shows, staff actively participated in FADA research initiatives, and participated in group exhibitions and completed design projects. Staff development continued with a number of staff attending workshops and courses of varying length related to research and teaching. Two staff members were registered for Doctoral studies and some were preparing for registering for Doctoral studies.

#### Marketing and branding

The department managed to successfully realise most of the marketing objectives which we set for ourselves in 2013. Ms C van Zyl, the marketing representative for the Department, showed great initiative, energy and enthusiasm to realise these objectives. The objectives are discussed in Section 12. MARKETING, point 12.1.

#### Technology

Mr B Gray ensured that equipment was state-of-the-art and students had access to the latest Macintosh digital technology and graphic design applications including the Adobe Master collection and the full Adobe Font folio which is installed on all Departmental computers. Six top-of-the-range new Apple Macintosh computers were acquired for use by senior students and the remainder of the computers were all serviced twice in the course of the year. Additional scanners were purchased for the studios and for digital training venue. Professional photography studio equipment was also purchased and set up for use by senior students.

#### Internationalisation

The department built on internationalisation initiatives which were introduced for the first time in 2012 while taking on some new initiatives. Ms I Hyson continued with the Chroma project, due to be completed in 2014, and Dr D Pretorius drove the INDIAFRICA poster contest in which three FADA students, one from the Graphic Design Department, and two from Multimedia, won cash prizes. The INDIAFRICA poster project is supported by the Public Diplomacy Division of India's Ministry of External Affairs which "strives to foster a greater understanding of India and its foreign policy concerns". The winning posters were exhibited at FADA and numerous high-profile guests, including the Indian High Commissioner, attended the opening. During the exhibition period the department also hosted Arnaub Chaudry from Disney India who showed his full-length animation film after which he fielded questions from students. The Department convened a pan African judging panel for the poster competition on which Ms I Hyson served. The Department hosted Professor Jennifer Cole-Phillips from the Maryland Institute College of Art, and she servedon the peer review panel for the programme review. The Department participated in the UJ student exchange programme and second year student Ms J Ferrer attended the Appalachian State University in North Carolina, USA in the second semester. In turn, Ms B Hadfield from East Stroudsburg University, Pennsylvania, USA attended some first year classes. As regards staff members, Ms R Cook participated in an

## **DEPARTMENT OF INDUSTRIAL DESIGN**

The Department of Industrial Design continues to maintain good throughput rates and high standards across all modules in the programmes on offer. The Department's success can be attributed to several factors: first, the Department has developed and continues to evolve an accurate selection procedure for incoming students; second, it continues with generalist industrial design training which exposes the students to all areas of industrial design and product development from research to production; third, the Department is in the fortunate position of having a strong link to professional industrial designers and these professionals continue to participate in the departments programmes through part time lecturing or employing students for holiday work; and fourth, both the academic and non-academic staff in the

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Department are committed to high quality teaching and learning and the continual refinement, development and pursuit of relevance in industrial design education in the Department's programmes and their individual modules.

#### Highlights of 2013

In 2013 the department took in the first cohort of BA Industrial Design students. This is the first, and currently only, BA programme for Industrial Design offered in South Africa. Although the Department did not meet the proposed student intake, as a first year of a new programme the Department was happy with the progress of the students and their results.

The BA Honours Industrial Design was submitted and approved within the university early in 2013 and also approved by the CHE and DHET by the end of the year. This programme will be uploaded on the HEQC online system in 2014 and will be offered by the department in 2016.

The Department's students continue to win prestigious competitions locally and this attracts good media coverage for the Department and the Faculty.

Department academics improved on the number of accredited journal outputs in 2013 to the highest level thus far.

Academic staff continue to conduct relevant research in areas within the Department's general ethos.

Two staff members, Mr K Brand and Ms J Hunkin, as MTech students, were involved in design for development projects – addressing real world solutions for some of South Africa's poorest communities.

Industrial Design was named one of the flagship programmes in the institution in 2013.

#### The strategic thrusts for 2013

To begin setting in place the systems required for a sustainable rapid prototyping centre;

To have the BA Honours: Industrial Design and Postgraduate Diploma Industrial Design approved through the FADA APQC, FADA Faculty Board and UJ HDC ready for submission to the CHE and DHET in 2014;

To continue to focus on student projects based on the Department's three core values: design for social development, sustainable design and user-centred design;

To further co-operate and complete projects in conjunction with the MRC, SeTAR and TEPRASM;

To join the Cumulus Group in conjunction with other departments in the Faculty;

To continue to publish Departmental project case studies on the Department's Facebook page, Picasa gallery, and website;

To have academic staff publish at least two articles in accredited journals;

To have two academics enrolled for PhD research.

In order to address these strategic thrusts by the department:

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The Department did not apply for the MA and PGD Industrial Design programmes. With futher refinement, these applications will be submitted in 2014;

Although the Department completed limited undergraduate student projects in the thrust area of design for development, the thrust areas of sustainable design and user centred design continue to be integrated in projects across all programmes within the department;

Mr C Bradnum and Mr M Bolton have both started their own research projects in HaMakuya in Limpopo which address design for development issues, these projects were supported financially by the MRC and laboratory tested by the SeTAR Centre;

The Department will join the Cumulus Group in 2014;

The Department exceeded the target of accredited journal outputs planned for 2013;

Only one of the academics is enrolled for PhD research, the second will submit a proposal in 2014.

#### For 2014 the Department has developed the following strategic objectives:

To begin talking to the institutions that offer Industrial Design education in Southern Africa in order to set up a colloquium in which these institutions can meet and exchange ideas about industrial design. This will include institutions in Uganda, Kenya, Botswana and the three institutions in South Africa;

To have academic staff publish at least 3 articles in accredited journals, aiming for a total of 2.5 DoHET accredited output points;

To have a second academic enrolled for PhD research in 2014;

To complete the internal UJ application for the programmes: MA Industrial Design and the Postgraduate Diploma in Industrial Design, ready to submit these to the CHE and DoHET early in 2015;

Mr C Bradnum to curate the exhibition for the Cumulus Conference 'Design for the other 90%' in September 2014;

The Department will introduce additional and relevant technology to the programmes including touchscreen illustration and additional Rapid Prototyping equipment;

The Department plans to complete benchmarking exercises against 3 African institutions and 2 European institutions in 2014 through to 2015;

The Department to submit creative outputs from academics to the FRC in 2014;

The Department will attempt to leverage the flagship status in 2014 by seeking either to appoint a Distinguished Professor or a Distinguished Visiting Professor.

## **DEPARTMENT OF INTERIOR DESIGN**

#### Departmental performance in 2013

#### Maintain good throughput rate and student performance

The Department delivered very good overall results in 2012 and aimed to continue the output in undergraduate results in 2013. The results presented in the 2013 annual report, indicate that the Department delivered on the Faculty targets for second and third year, but various challenges were experienced in the first year performance. The following throughput rates were delivered in 2013;

- First year average throughput rate 74% (One percent below target of 75% for first year Faculty) It should be noted that this is a significant drop in performance from 2012 (86%). First year performance was therefore identified as medium risk for the Department in 2013 and will continue to receive attention in 2014. Interviews that were conducted with applicants for the 2014 intake already indicated a further drop in average APS score.
  - Second year average throughput rate as 80% and indicates a 2% increase from 2012 (78%). This average is however below the 85% target of the Faculty.
  - Third year average throughput rate was exceptionally high and scored 97%. (Exceeds the Faculty target of 90% for third year). In 2012 the throughput rate was 90%. This exceptional performance indicates the value of a student body that entered with very good APS results and received thorough teaching and learning experience during their three to four year education.

The average throughput rate for the National Diploma is 84% and reflects and overall decrease of 1% in comparison to the 2012 results. Attention will be given to at-risk modules in 2014 to improve student performance although the Department will have to invest substantial additional effort in first year performance.

The BTech results reflect an average throughput rate of 80%. The performance level is down from the excellent average delivered in 2012 which was 90%. The BTech programme co-ordinator, Mr A Gill, monitored the performance of students closely throughout the year and referred students, when required to the Writing Centre for assistance.

#### Equity numbers and international students in first year

The equity intake in first year has increased steadily over the past five years. In 2010 37% equity candidates were selected for intake in 2011, this percentage was increased to 50% in 2011 for the 2012 intake and 52% in 2013. In 2013 three international students entered the programme, two from Angola and one Mozambique.

#### **Graduate output**

The Department will forward 24 NDip programme students and 7 BTech students to the graduation ceremony in April 2014. The graduate output has significantly decreased from 2012 to 2013 by 50% for BTech students. This was due to a higher percentage of part-time students that graduated in 2012.

#### Research output

In 2013, all the staff members contributed towards delivering research output. Four conference papers were delivered at the Design Education Conference that took place at the Vaal University of Technology in

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#### Industry project at third year level

The third year students and lecturers took part in a very interesting and successful industry project in 2013. The Department was approached by the company, Carst and Walker to take part in a partnership design project. This company was established in South Africa in 1934 and their main focus currently is importing and distributing chemical raw materials. Although the company has offices and warehouse facilities in all the major cities in South Africa, the Interior Design students were requested to redesign their offices that are located in Parktown.

The completed projects were presented to a six people that represented the company. This team included the CEO, from Ireland and Managing Director, from Cape Town. The feedback form the company was very positive and our students were described as talented and very professional. A first, second and third position was identified and the prizes were awarded at the Student Showcase Exhibition. The project can be described as very successful and presented students with excellent opportunity to engage with a 'real world' scenario.

The objectives included student performance and satisfaction, growth, programme development, teaching and learning development, marketing, collaboration, research, creative output, faculty participation, access, procedural compliance, student representation, profile building, awards and achievements, internal and external relationships, community projects, alumni, media coverage, international partnerships, staff development, equity, holistic development of students, relevance of programmes, technology thrusts, fiscal discipline, operations, energy savings, safety audits, risk audits, contribution to faculty strategy, alignment with UJ mission, sound governance, good communication, and personal staff initiatives.

The selection process for first year multimedia diploma students took place in November. Approximately 800 applications were made, from which 250 portfolios were invited, assessed and documented, with 64 being accepted for registration. Student enrolment targets were met in the Diploma programme, with four more first year students admitted than planned, putting some pressure on the computer studio usage. Total numbers were up from 163 in 2012 to 178 in 2013. Twenty-two applications for B Tech were interviewed of which 19 were accepted. Lack of accessible B Tech funding resulted in lower registration numbers.

First year throughput rate for 2013 was an average of 82.5%, second year was 90.5%, third year 96.2% and B Tech was 98%. Student satisfaction was evident in positive feedback from departmental student surveys and also from successes in competitions entered, these included two prizes in the India Africa awards. Efficient and effective student class representative committees were established, where the Departmental representative contributed to the Faculty Students' Forum.

Programme development for 2013 included an integration of citizenship into the existing curriculum, and the refinement of all existing modules. The application for a new BA Design in Digital Media, an Honours and an MA was submitted. The purpose of these new programmes is to prepare students for entry into a digital media design career and / or for postgraduate studies leading to an MA.

Active organisation and participation in Faculty and Departmental workshops took place where students attended a number of high level design workshops and presentations, these included workshops in human centered design, audio design, usability design, user experience design, information architecture and undergraduate research processes. Staff in the Department were actively involved in most research presentations in the faculty. Specific initiatives in the department included students entering local digital

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design competitions, completing briefs for contextual mapping, interface design, human factor research and game design. Students also contributed to collaborative projects with Graphic Design, Industrial Design and Fine Art departments, where subjects ranged from aids awareness design solutions, through "Green week" to game and interface design.

Quality assurance mechanisms in the department included management of academic administration, which was facilitated by a weekly departmental meeting where planning and implementation was ensured with an agenda and minutes. Students at risk were continuously monitored and high-risk modules were identified and monitored. The agenda and minutes were used as an active risk management tool.

Multimedia staff have been encouraged to develop creative practice led research where intentions were to publish and exhibit visual research, which could be built into respective teaching and learning. Departmental contributions were made to the Faculty research seminar, workshops, public lectures, conferences and seminars. Staff have presented papers at a number of conferences, chaired presentations and peer reviewed papers. Staff actively attended and contributed to all faculty research seminars. The department actively participated in both undergraduate and postgraduate research workshops, on and off campus.

Staff development plans progressed with investment in various academic skills workshops. Development plans from all staff were submitted and appraised with performance contracts. Plans for further study were established. Qualification upgrading is an interest pursued by all permanent staff in the department. Mr A Ambala registered for a PhD in Film and Television at the University of the Witwatersrand, where Mr N Mntambo also submitted a proposal. Mr T Fenn has registered for a Master's in Information Technology (as a route to a PhD in this field) at the University of Cape Town. Postgraduate production and supervision training is well attended by multimedia staff and is coordinated through the regular staff meetings held in the department. Subject specific training is attended throughout the year when it becomes available. Capacity building in writing for publication continues to be part of the strategy for 2014.

The Department budget spending was kept on track with consideration of income and expenditure. Effective and efficient departmental structure and operations were carried out, and where possible equitable workloads and responsibilities were shared amongst staff in the department where responsibilities were all agreed on at weekly staff meetings. Waste and energy saving initiatives were implemented where dustbins were provided for waste paper in the studios, lights and computers switched off as and when remembered and student project briefs made available online to save paper

Efficient space and equipment usage included adherence to timetable bookings and optimal use of studio spaces, where the programme was timetabled to fit all students into computer labs. All years were split into groups to fit into 30 seat studios and computer labs. Computer labs were timetabled for more efficient equipment usage. Camera and other equipment booking times were managed for optimal usage. All space usage monitored and optimised at weekly staff meetings as a standard agenda item. All equipment usage monitored and optimised at weekly staff meetings as a standard agenda item. Timetable adherence checked at weekly staff meetings, bookings of shared spaces made timeously and health and safety monitored through weekly staff meetings where the departmental risk register is maintained.

## **DEPARTMENT OF VISUAL ART**

In keeping with the University's Strategic Thrusts, the year under review is characterised by an intense engagement with improving the quality of programmes in order to advance discipline-specific knowledge, engage in research and improve the academic acumen of the students.

While the Department met its enrolment targets in all programmes, difficulties in meeting an ideal enrolment persist. The challenges of the existing competitor departments in the Higher Education landscape, combined with a propensity for students to enrol for Degree programmes, further exacerbates the problem. Hopefully the new marketing programme will help to address the issue of access to a skills-based, vocational-orientated Diploma programme with the possibility for students to engage in postgraduate study at Master's and Doctoral Degree levels. The University's strict admissions policy has also impacted negatively on the recruitment figures as students are no longer allowed to attend admissions selection tests as late as January of the year of enrolment.

- D. The FADA / Central Johannesburg College (CJC) Initiative: Contrary to expectation, it was not possible to pursue dialogue with the Central Johannesburg College (CJC) regarding collaboration during the year under review. The articulation of CJC students into FADA Programmes was not feasible, without satisfying the University's language requirements for admission to undergraduate programmes. Unless there is some level of academic support for English language compliance amongst such students, it will not be possible to admit a large cohort of students from the College into the Faculty. This matter will have to be debated much further in order to meet requirements for admission. However, the Visual Art Department has maintained a working relationship with the Art and Design School at the CJC in terms of:

## **DEPARTMENT OF INDUSTRIAL DESIGN**

#### Year and Module Coordinators:

The Department's system of year and module area coordinators works very well. Through the year coordinator system, academic staff members remain in touch with the year group issues and are able to resolve student problems very quickly. Having individual academic staff members responsible for the continuity of module areas helps to create a consistent development strategy at each year and at the correct NQF level. (Rating: excellent)

#### Portfolio Assessments and Moderations:

The Department continues with a system of panel reviewed portfolio assessments and moderations at midyear and year end. For the exit level years these moderation include external panel members who are expert in the module area. The system ensures that the standard of the programmes offerings is reviewed, commented on and remains high. (Rating: very good)

#### Internal Teaching and Module Evaluations:

In 2013 the Department completed internal teaching and module evaluations for all modules in the NDip and BTech programmes. The results of these evaluations were discussed by the HoD with individual lecturers. The system of internal evaluations are specific and directly useful to the department. (Rating: good)

#### ID Department Meetings:

The HoD convenes Departmental meetings once a month. These are kept relatively short as staff members often informally discuss department issues and resolve these as they occur. Additionally, many of the year group issues are resolved by the year coordinators. However, the department staff meetings allow formal requests, information transfer and strategic development to take place. Having one meeting per month was found to be adequate for 2013 and the Department will continue in the same pattern in 2014. (Rating: good)

#### ID Student Representative Committee:

The system of constituting a Department Student Representative Committee allows student's direct access to the HoD to voice year group and module concerns which might not be resolved by their year coordinator. Four meetings were held in 2013 and it is likely that a similar number will be held in 2014. (Rating: good)

#### Postgraduate students:

MTech students are managed by their individual supervisors and the supervisors are advised by the department research committee as well as affiliated postgraduate supervisors in the Faculty and elsewhere in the University. Academic staff that supervise students have access to supervisor training within the institution and are developing their individual ability to supervise students at this level. Progress is good. (Rating: good)

## DEPARTMENT OF JEWELLERY DESIGN AND MANUFACTURE

## DEPARTMENT OF MULTIMEDIA

First year applications were monitored carefully, with APS scores of 30 and above being considered first when assessing the applicants' portfolio submissions. An increase of minimum APS scores will need to be given attention in the near future. ## **DEPARTMENT OF VISUAL ART**

The quality management system is successful. On a monthly basis, the year coordinators provide regular feedback at staff meetings on the progress and status of the students' performance. Risk students are discussed and a prognosis to mitigate risk is developed. At first year level, a more focussed attention is required on developing academic writing skills amongst the less-prepared students. Here, the input of tutors has proven invaluable. At third and fourth year level, the system of revolving academic staff input per student is inviolable. This is an extremely successful way of teaching senior students because the benefit of viewpoints from multi-disciplinary perspectives greatly increases the student's exposure to knowledge and information. The group critiques, which follow, provide an accurate assessment of the student's performance and a critical developmental path is identified and explained to the student. On matters technical, the Senior Lecturer (sculpture) supervises the work of the Technical Assistant in terms of workshop requirements, health and safety matters and technical preparedness of the teaching venues. The Technical Assistant attends relevant training workshops e.g., health and safety, welding training etc. Workplace and studio assistants are appointed as part of their workplace-learning requirement, to assist with the organisation of material and physical resources in the studio. Possible areas in need of closer attention include the upkeep of machinery and equipment in the studios as well as the provision of an access control system, which had to be abandoned owing to budgetary cuts. The timetabling and use of physical resources works well.

• FADA Green Week 2013 – 3<sup>rd</sup> Year students from all departments in the Faculty worked on sustainable design solutions for problems they had identified through research.

- Tshulu Stove Project Mr C Bradnum field tested 30 X improved wood burning stoves in the HaMakuya area in Limpopo. At the end of the field trial, a series of design and co-creation workshops were conducted with the test group. A further 50 X improved wood burning stoves were handed to community members to field test. The stoves were laboratory tested by the SeTAR Centre and proved to be remarkably efficient. The project aims to: improve indoor air quality in rural household kitchens, reduce the drudgery of collecting wood, improve the ergonomics of cooking from that of a three stone fire, reduce deforestation, and include end users as decision makers in design for development projects.
- HaMakuya Hydroponics Project Mr M Bolton designed and field tested a rural hydroponics kit in the HaMakuya area in Limpopo. The project aims to: reduce water wastage through evaporation when growing vegetables, improve harvest potential of home grown vegetables, and make cost effective hydroponic systems available to rural households.
- Ivory Park Retained Heat Cooker Project Ms J Hunkin completed her MTech research on the retained heat cooker in the Ivory Park area. Her prototypes were exhibited as a portion of the department's student exhibition at the end of the year.
- Mr K Brand, under the supervision of Mr A Campbell, completed the design and testing work for the Small Scale Farming Kit in Soweto. The results and products from his MTech research were exhibited at the student exhibition at the end of the year.

In 2014 the Department will continue selecting projects that focus on these core priorities.

#### **DEPARTMENT OF INTERIOR DESIGN**

In the National Diploma lecturers engaged with a number of projects in 2013 that promoted social responsibility and environmental sustainability among students and also staff. These were;

- Collaborative project as part of second year Interior Design and first year Industrial Design's respective curriculums. Interior Design students designed a children's chair, the Industrial Design students manufactured it. Chairs were donated to Orphanage in 2014.
- The second year students were required to research available building materials and finishes that have the lowest environmental impact in the module Materials and Finishes 2. These materials needed to be analysed according to one of the acceptable environmental assessment tools.
- The third year students conducted a survey of three recycle stations on the APB campus for
  Occupational Safety. This improved their understanding of waste management on the Campus.
  The results and outcome of the project was presented to Anzani Rautenbach.
- All third year students took part in Green Design Week.
- In third year the South African Constitution and social rights of people were debated in the module. Professional Practice 3.

communicated to the public using images and text. The final designs were displayed in the atrium
during Diversity Week.

In the BTech programme all students were required to address and reconcile environmental, social and economic issues that were appropriate to their chosen study topics. The following projects addressed socially relevant aspects;

Creating a Department of Environmental Affairs Sustainability Centre in Newtown, Johannesburg Focusing on Awareness and Education of the Environment.

This project was one of three projects in the institution that were chosen to be presented at the U21 Conference that took place in July 2013. The student attended the conference and delivered a verbal presentation at the conference.

#### **DEPARTMENT OF VISUAL ART**

The Department's research focus on art for social change and development places it as a forerunner in the Faculty in terms of the UJ strategic thrust related to social relevance and social responsibility. Prof Berman's role in this regard is invaluable. The undergraduate programme has a curriculated focus on art and citizenship especially at first and second year levels. Students have opportunities to develop this focus in their work at third, fourth and Masters' levels. On a more practical level, the students' involvement in the Green Design week programme and the curriculum-integration IOHA HIV/AIDS poster design awareness campaign, are indicators of social responsibility amongst the students. Other initiatives include the fourth year work-integrated learning programme that involves the students' visit to the rural community of HaMakuya in Limpopo, as well as the students' involvement in the Mandela Day programme at the Helen Joseph Hospital and the third year students' involvement in the Germiston hospital mural painting project.

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
