Van der Walt, Dineke Art History (PhD)

The moral reckoning effected by the #MeToo movement has resulted in numerous art exhibitions that address sexual violence in contemporary societies, that offer critique of artworks from the past with narratives seeming to sanction such violence, or that call out artists whose personal conduct is known to have been sexually exploitative. In her important study, Dineke van der Walt explores strategies that curators have deployed to negotiate this challenging subject matter. She argues that it is necessary to construct safe spaces in which viewers can engage with the complex issues that the works raise. She also suggests that, while enlightening viewers through a careful discursive framing of works on display, curators need to be mindful not to re-traumatise survivors, This is not an easy topic to take on, and, as one of her examiners commented, the candidate is to be congratulated for "confronting and tackling" such difficult issues "so expertly".

Dineke van der Walt (Orton) is the incoming art curator of the University of Johannesburg. Visual arts curator for the Klein Karoo National Arts Festival from 2020 and the Aardklop Arts Festival from 2021, she won kykNET Fiësta Awards for her curatorial work in 2021 and 2022, a Kanna Nomination for Best

Contribution to Visual Arts for 2022 and was a joint BASA Award Winner in 2017. Co-author of a chapter in a scholarly book on educating people about gender-based violence, she is also the author of "Cleansing shame: Airing South Africa's dirty laundry" (2023) in the scholarly journal *Image & Text*.

Oloba, Peter Babajide (PhD)

Peter Babajide Oloba matriculated from the Ajigba Grammar School, Olle-Bunu, Nigeria, in 1997. He obtained a Diploma in Education, specialising in Agricultural Science Education from the Federal College of Education, Okene, Nigeria, in 2001. Peter taught in several primary and secondary schools in Nigeria from 2001 to 2014. In 2008, he completed his BEd degree in Guidance and Counselling at Adekunle Ajasin University, Akungba-Akoko, Nigeria. In 2015, he obtained his BEd Honours in Educational Management from Leadership and the University Johannesburg. Thereafter, he completed his MEd degree (cum laude) in Educational Leadership and Management from the same university. He has been tutoring and lecturing (part-time) for the Faculties of Education and of Humanities at the University of Johannesburg since 2015.

This research focused on stakeholders' experiences and perceptions of the introduction and implementation of system-wide change in the Nigerian basic education system. The study, located within the constructivist research paradigm, adopted a generic qualitative research design. Individual semi-structured interviews and qualitative content analysis were used for data generation and data analysis, respectively. The findings identify those stakeholders who should ideally be involved in a system-

wide change process. The challenges the stakeholders faced in the introduction and implementation of system-wide change and the consequences of not adhering to the tenets of system-wide change were also revealed. Finally, stakeholders stated how they believed system-wide change could best be managed satisfyingly and sustainably. The contribution of this study is in its recommendations for systemic change initiatives for the future of the Nigerian basic education system.

Willemse, Jana Mari (PhD)

Jana-Mari Willemse has been a primary school teacher responsible for languages and Life Skills education for the past ten years. She holds a BEd (UJ), BEd Psychology Honours (UP), and an MEd in Inclusive Education (UJ). Her research explores parental involvement in sexuality conversations with their children at home.

The backdrop of this research was initiated in response to the Department of Basic Education's introduction of Comprehensive Sexuality Education (CSE) in schools, which spurred significant parental resistance. Many parents asserted that they were fully equipped to provide sexuality education to their children themselves, but findings from this study reveal otherwise. This qualitative study involved semi-structured interviews with a diverse cohort of parents residing in the Gauteng province. While parents expressed acknowledgment of the importance of sexuality education, they also candidly admitted to their own lack of foundational knowledge and confidence when broaching this delicate subject with their children. Cultural and religious values emerged as significant barriers, impeding parents' ability to initiate open and comfortable conversations about the diverse aspects of sexuality. The contribution of this study is towards development of a home-school partnership tool to equip parents with the necessary knowledge and skills to facilitate meaningful discussions about sexuality within their families.
