

UNESCO Director-General Commends Funda UJabule and Invites It to Join UNESCO's Network of Associated Schools

UNESCO's Director-General, Audrey Azoulay, has recently praised Funda UJabule for its innovative teaching model and the use of indigenous languages to promote inclusivity. During her visit to the Sowetobased school in April, Azoulay highlighted the significance of teaching in indigenous languages and invited Funda UJabule to join UNESCO's network of associated schools.

Azoulay's visit forms part of strengthening ties between UNESCO and the local education sector. The visit started with a warm welcome from the school choir. During the DG's address she said "we are very interested in this unique model", expressing admiration for the school's approach. She emphasized UNESCO's commitment to multilingual education, recognising the challenges but also the importance of such efforts.

The visit followed South Africa's participation in the 41st UNESCO General Conference in France, where former Minister of Basic Education, Angie Motshekga, invited Azoulay to the country. Accompanying Azoulay were UJ Chancellor Dr. Phumzile Mlambo-Ngcuka, former UJ Vice-Chancellor and Principal Professor Ihron Rensburg, and Johannesburg's Central District Director for Education, Tshepo Seate.

This visit showcased South Africa's capabilities in education, culture, and science, aligning with UNESCO's mandate. Azoulay toured the state-of-the-art school and observed how mother tongue education is taking place in a Grade 1 class at the school.

Professor Sarah Gravett, the acting Deputy Vice-Chancellor of Research and Innovation at UJ, and also one of the key founders of Funda UJabule, expressed joy at the school's recognition. She credited support from UJ's leadership in close partnership with the DBE for the school's success.

The principal, Ms Sabina Lukhuleni expressed gratitude, saying, "It's such an honour that a person from UNESCO would leave everything to come to our school and want to learn about how we do things here."

University of Cincinnati Student Teachers Explore FUJS Makerspace

On 20 May 2024, student teachers from the University of Cincinnati visited the Makerspace at Funda UJabule as part of an exchange programme. The visit was a collaborative effort between the Department of Childhood Education (DCE) at UJ and our international partners.

Honours, 4th-year, and 3rd-year students from DCE guided the visiting students through the makerspace, illustrating its tools and resources while explaining its practical applications. Mr. Baloyi, along with DCE students, demonstrated how coding and robotics concepts are integrated into teaching across the Foundation and Intermediate Phases. This exchange of ideas introduced both familiar and novel concepts to the visiting students, who reflected on adapting similar methods in their teaching practices.

The interaction didn't end at technical demonstrations. Both groups of student teachers engaged in discussions about classroom challenges, such as maintaining student engagement during lessons. This dialogue facilitated the exchange of teaching strategies, including UJ's innovative "Making as a Pedagogy" programme, which encourages integrating educational robots into various subjects beyond STEM.

The Cincinnati students highlighted a disparity in their curriculum, where coding and robotics education is primarily limited to STEM subjects. They expressed how this restricts both teachers and students, emphasizing the need for broader integration across disciplines. This perspective resonated with UJ's DCE students, prompting them to reconsider traditional teaching boundaries.

Moreover, the visit sparked a broader conversation about educational philosophies. Cincinnati students, some of whom specialise in music education, shared insights into how early exposure to diverse subjects empowers students to choose their educational paths. This exchange challenged our students to rethink their teaching approaches and embrace a more interdisciplinary curriculum.

The visit concluded with mutual admiration: the Cincinnati students were impressed by FUJS Makerspace and inspired by UJ's innovative teaching methods, while our students gained new perspectives on curriculum flexibility and interdisciplinary education.

Surprise Class Visit by the Dean and DVC on Soweto Campus

'Conscientizing' Future Education Psychologists on Existing Tools and Sources of Data for Assessments

The Department of Educational Psychology at UJ aims to train future educational psychologists who are responsive to the diverse needs of the community. The objective is always to learn from Western theoretical theories and practices but being conscious of applying it differently to meet the cultural and social dynamics inherent in South Africa. Thus using principles of community psychology and systemic factors that shape a child's development that is unique to the South African context.

The department has implemented several systemic interventions in the past quarter, working with children, their families, and the broader community. The policies and documents are what underpins the inclusive education system, and students are trained to integrate information from the Social Needs Assessment (SNA) forms in their evaluations. This insight helps guide interview processes and suggest resources for parents and educators. The value of collaborative relationships between psychologists, parents, and educators is underscored. These principles were enacted in two projects this quarter. M1 M.Ed. Psych students were guided through the SIAS process, while M2 M.Ed. Psych students undertook a psychoeducation assessment project at Lakeview Full Service Primary School. The objective hereof was to conscientize our future educational psychologists of their important role as 'advocates' for systemic change by engaging with multiple stakeholders.



PURPOSE OF THESE ENGAGEMENTS:

To meet support staff, conduct parent intakes identified by the SBST as at-risk, peruse schoolbooks and SNA documents. Plan for Ed-Psych assessment of this cohort of at-risk learners.

Parent Financial Support Talk [2024]

Facilitated by Rev. Deon van der Merwe and in collaboration with SASSA and some financial advisors, the Parent Financial Support Talk 2024 aimed to enhance parents' financial IQ, impart success principles, and encourage goal setting to expand their financial means. Schools play a vital role in community education by creating such impactful spaces. This initiative is a significant resource in community development strategies.

World Menstruation Day

Systemic approaches entail working with the children directly and often engaging in discussions regarding difficult or uncomfortable topics in a meaningful, developmentally appropriate manner. This is particularly important when working with vulnerable children as they arguably have less access to education and resources, thus placing them at greater psychosocial risk than children from traditional family settings. Such a topic is menstruation, which is

often still considered a taboo topic surrounded by stigma.

As a result of poor knowledge and access to appropriate resources, menstruation often results in girl children being unable to attend school. Members of the Department of Educational Psychology presented a series of talks for the girl children at Carl Sithole as part of an initiative for World Menstruation Day, where various topics regarding menstruation were unpacked. The talks provided essential knowledge about their changing bodies, menstrual hygiene practices, and emotional support needed to manage the effects of hormonal change during the adolescent years. This educative programme sought to normalise menstruation while reducing stigma associated with periods. The goal was to equip the girls with the confidence and understanding to manage their periods effectively and create a supportive environment between them and their caregivers. Sanitary pads were also distributed.

St Benedict's Boys' School Invite DVP Kerry Kennedy to their Embrace Symposium

St Benedicts is a Catholic School for Boys in Bedfordview. Strongly committed to transformation in South Africa its school population reflects the diversity in society. It holds an Embrace symposium each year "aimed at creating a space where we engage with likeminded experts and individuals in exploring our role in the promotion of social justice and social cohesion in our schools". Having come across the ECS website describing the Department's Social Justice and Human Rights Project, DVP Kennedy was invited to speak at the 2024 Embrace Symposium.

The audience for Embrace 2024 was coordinators with responsibility for outreach and charity, St Benedict's parents and a number of students. In addition, although the event was created and coordinated by St Benedict's, there were several representatives from ISASA present, and representatives of other schools linked to ISASA.



Prof Kennedy, drawing on Professor Nel Noddings' care ethics, spoke about the ways caring can become a natural part of day to day living. We can 'care for' those with whom we can develop a personal relationship and we can 'care about' those who are at a distance, but in need of support and can benefit from outreach. In this sense, caring is a form of charity that focuses on giving oneself rather than donations for a particular cause or time for volunteering.

There was a question and answer session following the talk. This included some very insightful questions from students who were very interested in ways to create a 'caring' environment on the school campus, especially in exercising student 'voice'. Others were interested in the kind of outreach that would be encouraged from a 'caring' school. There were ongoing discussions even after the Q&A session and Prof Kennedy's PowerPoint was made available to all participants.

St Benedict's Embrace Day was organized by two St Benedict's teachers, Geraldine Pillay-Viret and David Edwards, a UJ alumnus who holds a master's degree in Educational Leadership. This kind of community link is important to nurture. The day's talk showed how academic work can be made relevant to the concerns of schools and their communities and how interaction can be productive in achieving a better understanding of our role as educators.




Faculty of Education Celebrates Top Achievers of 2023
